Seven-man Ringwood Team Defends Comm. Leag. Title, Beats Ajax In Three Straight

Winning the Community Hockey League title is nothing new for Ringwood. They've been doing it now for the past five years. On Friday night, however, they turned the trick with a skeleton club of only seven men. They downed Ajax 6-4 to sweep the series in three straight. The lineup included Glenn Jackson, Ron Guy, Doug McInnis, Ted Redshaw, Ross Madill, Jake Harman and Larry Brown.

Arena Manager W. T. Rennie presented the trophy to the Ringwood team captain, Ronnie Guy.

Although badly outnumbered in the player's box, Ringwood looked much the superior club on the ice. They out-shot their rivals 47 to 36 including a 19-shot barrage in the first period.

It was a fitting conclusion to the contest and the season that captain Ron Guy should fire the would-be winner on Friday. It came at 11:41 of the third period and broke a 4-4 tie. Doug McInnis, his companion defence-man, picked up an assist on the marker. Ross Madill, a 3-goal marksman on the night, blasted the clincher into the empty Ajax cage with only 45 seconds to go in the game. McInnis, who collected a total of five points, also set up the last tally. Larry Brown, a valuable addition this season to the Ringwood roster, and Ted Redshaw notched singles. Al Pope, Mac Roland, Art Rennie and Bob Tripp were the Ajax marksmen.

Match Penalty
Bob Tripp of Ajax was given the old heave-ho from the game in the final frame when he charged referee Ford Sisson after he was tagged with a high sticking penalty. It required players from both sides to restrain him.

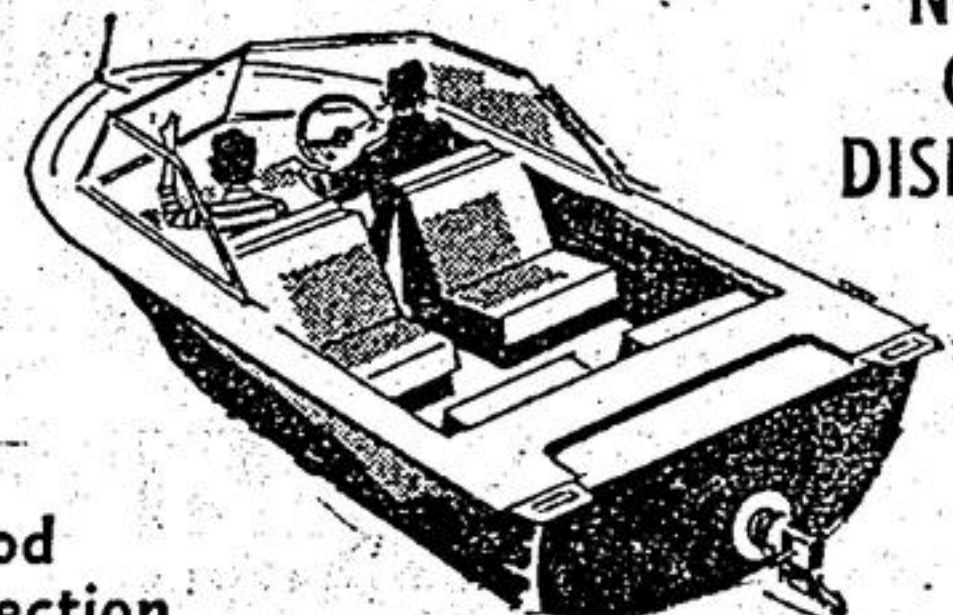
