Tom Burnie, 43, had been renting a fish house periodically from a local fish hut operator. Tom cut a new hole and placed the rent-hut on said hole, which he baited regularly. Mr. Burnie then brought his own hut out, removed the hut operator's hut off the new hole and placed it on the original hole, and placed his own hut on the freshly cut hole. The unidentified hut operator appeared on the scene and told Mr. Burnie he had two hours to remove his hut from that area. Mr. Burnie replied that it was

a free country and he would place his hut anywhere on the lake he wished. When the hut operator returned and found Tom still "sittin' and fishin'," he placed a rope around the fish hut and tied the other end to his Bombardier. As he was getting into his snow vehicle to drag the fish hut and occupant away, Tom put his arm through the window and cut the rope with a knife. 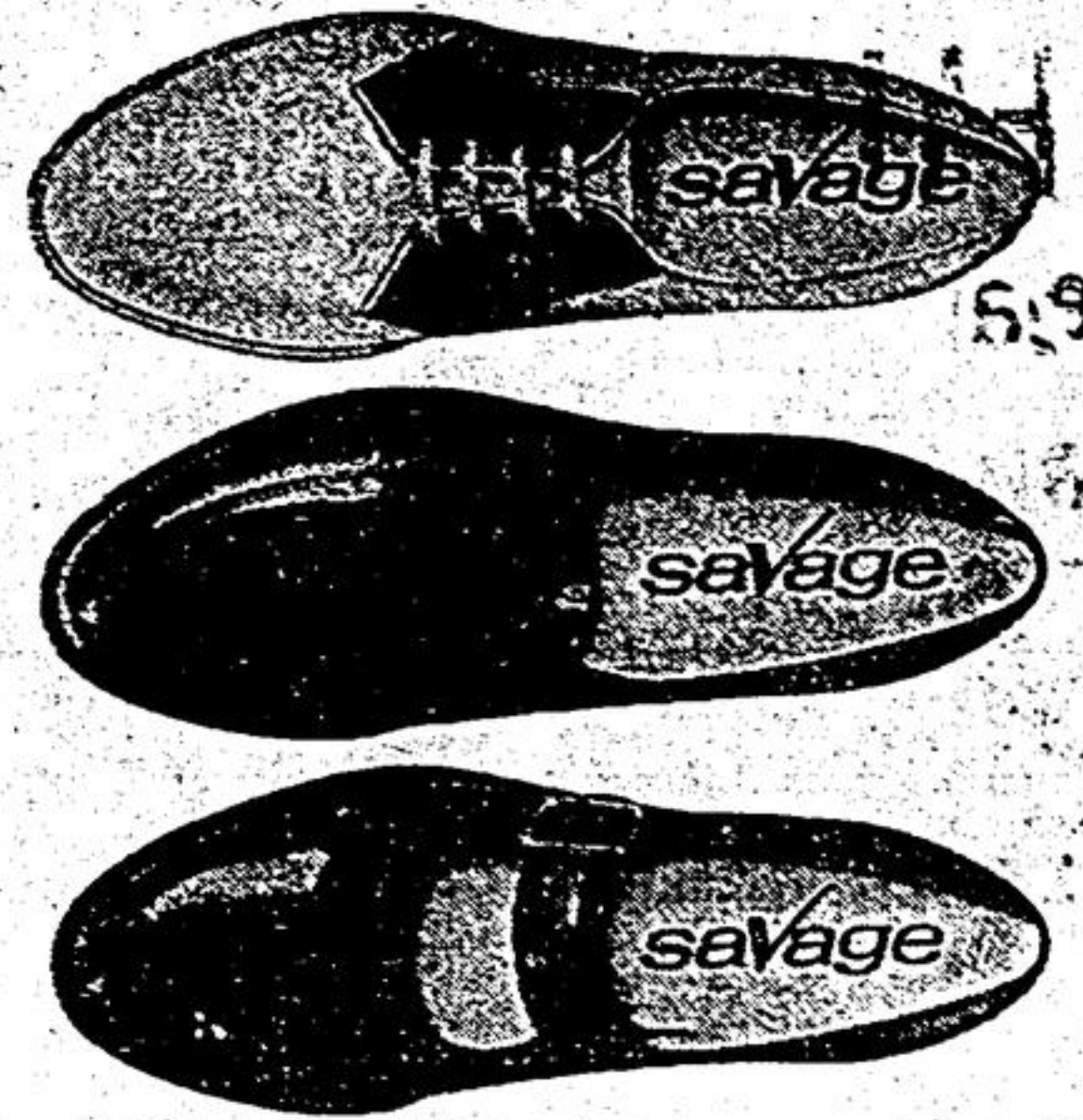

**Markham Township OK's School Additions**

Markham Township council on Monday approved of additions to high schools at Thornhill and Richmond Hill as requested by the York Central Board. The chairman and Markham Board representatives were present to explain the situation to council. It was explained that a special government grant of \$27,000 had been arranged for to be paid as work progressed. Chairman John Honsberger said that the municipalities of Vaughan and Richmond Hill had already given their consent. He told council that a joint meeting should be held with council to discuss the demands expected in the next five years. The budget total for this year is \$3,189,270 as against \$2,731,604 last year. Teachers salaries are up from \$1,477,318 to \$1,740,341. The amount of the budget to be raised by municipal taxes has gone up this year from \$1,600,856 to \$1,820,322.
