Burness W. Heise, 62, Helped War Children

A former deputy minister of public welfare for Ontario, Burness W. Heise, 62, died Sunday in St. Michael's hospital.

Appointed official guardian for the many British children sheltered in Canada during World War II, Mr. Heise was made an officer of the Order of the British Empire and awarded the George V Jubilee Medal and the George VI Coronation Medal.

Once a field worker with the Buffalo Children's Aid Society and for four years director of the society in Hamilton, Mr. Heise spent nine years with the welfare department as superintendent of the Children's Aid branch before taking the deputy's post in 1944.

Among his other interests was the provision of adequate housing for the elderly. He contended that the elderly needed a sense of belonging, and when the department unveiled plans for future institutions for the aged, 16 years ago, he argued that they should be permitted to feel independent.

Mr. Heise was chairman of the United Church's commission on the urban frontier, a group set up to study the church's relations with persons living in urban areas, and was secretary of the church's committee of employed churchmen. The latter group is studying ways in which laymen might become engaged in full-time church work.

He was born in Stouffville and graduated in 1925 from the University of Toronto School of Social Work. He leaves his wife, Violet Francesca and two daughters, Mrs. Allan McGuire and Mrs. Derek Morley, both of Toronto, also a sister, Enna, Mr. Heise was a son of the late Jacob Heise, a former lumber dealer of Stouffville.

After resting at the Earle Elliott Funeral Home, 2287 Yonge St. service was held on Wednesday from Rosedale United Church, with interment in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Missionary Cantata In Markham U. M. Church

A new Missionary Cantata, "Let the Earth Hear His Voice" will be presented for the first time in this area on Sunday evening April 18th at 7:30 p.m. in the Markham United Missionary Church. A 42 voice choir under the direction of Mrs. Harold Knights will sing this most recent composition of Eugene L. Clark. It includes choir arrangements of familiar missionary hymns together with more recent missionary songs and some of Mr. Clark's new compositions. This music clearly presents the vital importance of missions in the local church and to individual Christians. Accompanying musicians will be Mrs. Jack Shepherd, pianist, Jim McDowell, organist and John Amos, violinist. This Cantata is being presented as part of the Missionary Conference of the Markham and Dickson's Hill United Missionary Churches.

On Tuesday evening the Conference will continue with a service in the Dickson's Hill Church at 8 p.m. when Miss E. Cressman from Nigeria will be speaking and showing coloured slides. Miss Cressman is a nurse and for a number of years served at the United Missionary Society Memorial Hospital at Tungan Magajiya, Nigeria, but during her last tour was released from nursing duties to take training in linguistics. A tape recording from Rev. Alfred Rees will also be played in this service.

On Wednesday evening Miss Edna Pridham also from Nigeria will be speaking in the Markham Church. Miss Pridham has had a varied ministry during her 19 years in Nigeria. She has been engaged in medical work, has taught in Bible Schools and supervised evangelism in the villages. More recently she has conducted Christian Life Classes among the children in primary schools and has taught in the Mission's Theological College. In the Wednesday evening service a tape recording will be played from Missionary Willis Hunking in Nigeria.

On Thursday evening the service will again be in the Dickson's Hill Church at 8 p.m. Rev. Murray McLeod who has spent a number of years in India as a missionary will be the speaker. Mr. McLeod is now a teacher in the Toronto Bible College. A special feature of this service will be the showing of a 30 minute coloured sound film entitled "Conquering Jungle Barriers." This film, produced by the Missionary Aviation Fellowship features missionary martyr Nate Saint telling how effective the aeroplane is in reaching the un-reached in Ecuador. His widow, Mrs. MacLeod, adds an introduction and a gripping challenge. This is a film the whole family is invited to see.

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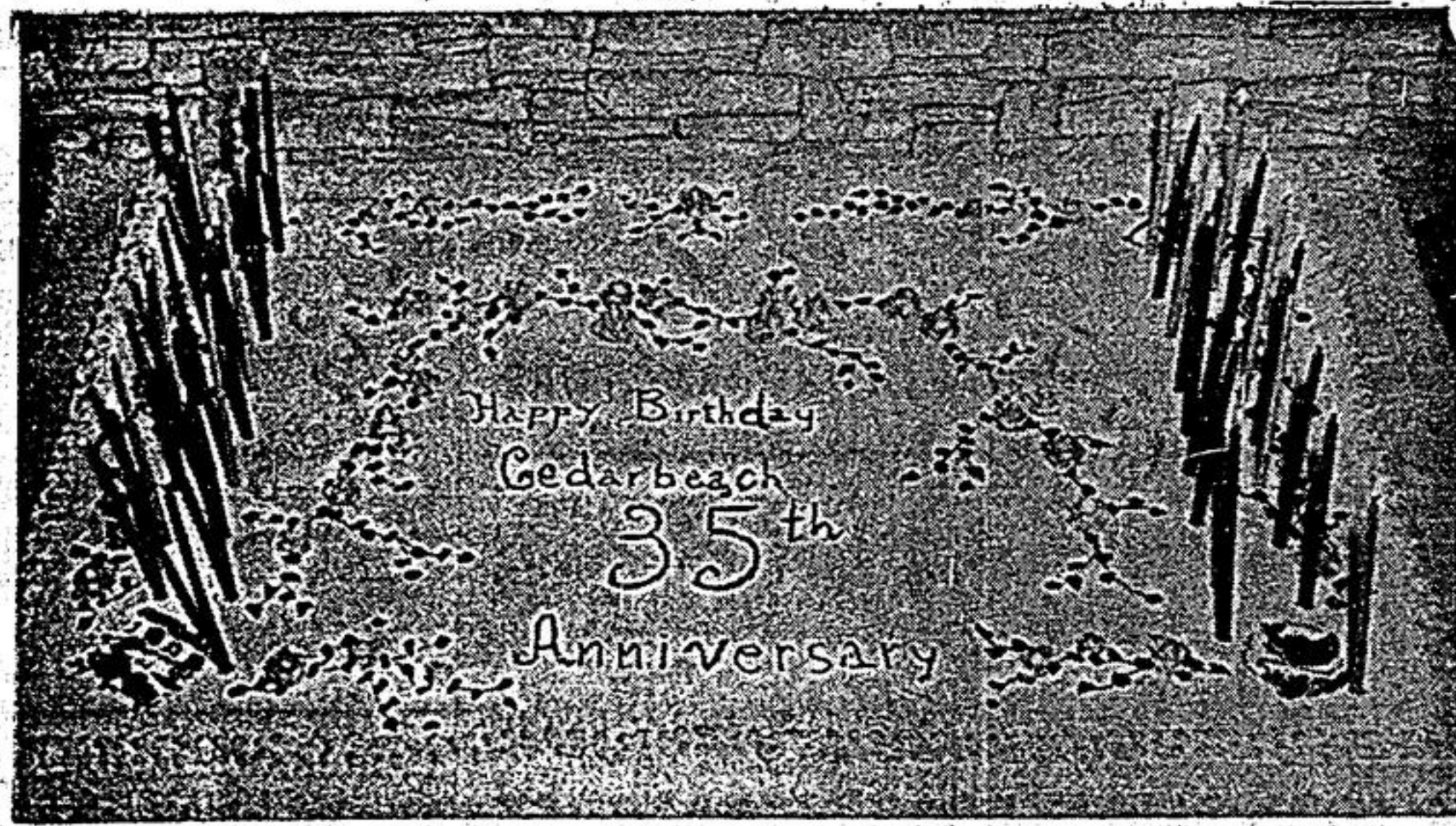
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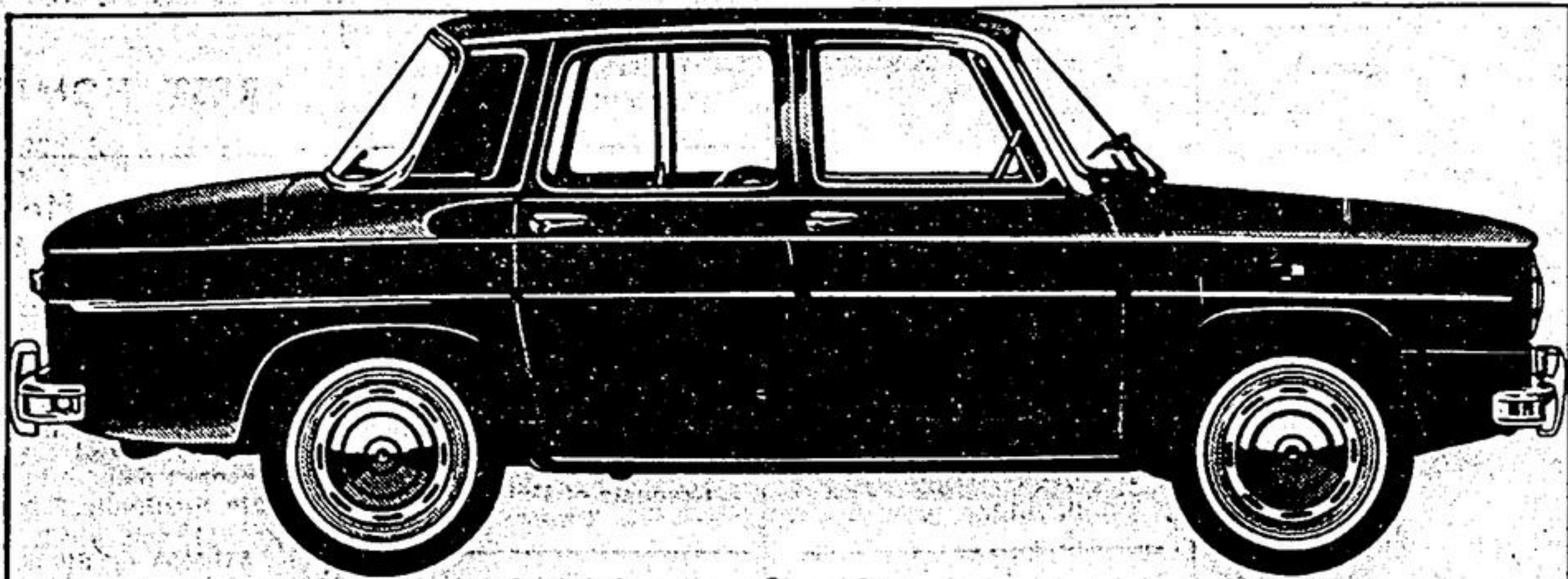
