Appointed official guardian for the many British children sheltered in Canada during World War II, Mr. Heise was made an officer of the Order of the British Empire and awarded the George V Jubilee Medal and the George VI Coronation Medal.

Once a field worker with the Buffalo Children's Aid Society and for four years director of University of Toronto School of the society in Hamilton, Mr. Heise spent nine years with the welfare department as superintendent of the Children's Aid branch before taking the deputy's post in 1944.
