**Markham Council Debates Forestry Station Removal**

The federal government is preparing to remove the forestry station at Maple to Sault Ste. Marie. Councillor Palmer is endeavoring to promote the idea of a university in the township, is urging that council protest the removal of the station with the idea of having it incorporated into the university.

Mr. Palmer introduced the matter to council again on Monday, arguing that a delegation be sent to Ottawa. He said that county council was taking up the matter and was being supported by Vaughan Twp. and Richmond Hill. He said 75% of the work at the station was technical and the local location was much better than Sault Ste. Marie.

Councillor Palmer condemned his own council for being lax in not fighting the issue to the limit.

Deputy-reeve Rumble said that after hearing reports of Reeve Hooper and councillor Palmer concerning the meeting of other councils, he wondered if they had both been at the same meeting.

Councillor Chas. Hoover, supported by Mr. Rumble put forward a motion to support any action taken by county council and the other municipalities. Councillor Palmer's amendment to send a delegation and the motion passed. Only councillor Palmer and Reeve Hooper favored a special delegation.

**Lawns Respond To Spring Care**

Early spring is the time to clean up the lawn, say horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture. As soon as the ground has dried up so that there is no danger of compaction, the lawn may be lightly raked.

Rake off dead leaves, twigs, stones and other debris. To avoid pulling grass plants out by the roots, use a light spring rake rather than a heavy steel rake. Do not rake out all the dead grass since it will soon rot and add a little humus to the soil.

A light rolling will firm the soil around grass roots which have been lifted by the freezing and thawing action of winter. Rolling will also help to level the lawn and facilitate mowing. Care should be taken that soil conditions are suitable when rolling. If the soil is too wet, compaction and loss of porosity will occur, and if it is too dry the purposes of rolling will not be accomplished. One rolling in early spring should be sufficient for the year.

Fertilizer may also be applied before active growth begins to avoid danger of burning. Use special turf fertilizer and apply at rates recommended by the manufacturer.
