## Leadership In Sad State Says Former N. York P.C. Member

The leadership of the Progressive-Conservative Party is in a "sad state of affairs," C. A. Cathers, former PC federal member for York North, told a general meeting of the York North group at King City last week.

During the evening, the controversial film, "Mr. Pearson," a study of the prime minister, was shown.

"It's too bad we haven't our leadership problem settled," Mr. Cathers said. Mr. Diefenbaker reached the top in the 1958 election with 205 seats, but now he and the party have flunked completely.

Mr. Cathers said he felt the general public was going to lose confidence in either of the old parties and strengthen the splinter groups.

He described the Pearson film as one that would do "much more for the Progressive Conservative Party than I ever would," but admitted that the job of prime minister was an onerous one.

"The responsibilities of the prime minister and the leader of the opposition are far beyond what any man should have to carry," Mr. Cathers said.

Among the things he suggested that would lighten the load of the prime minister was that the responsibility of choosing a cabinet be taken away from him with regional groups picking the ministers, so as to promote more of a feeling of "being part of a team."

He said this would also result in less harassment to the prime minister.

Mr. Cathers said he did not feel there would be a federal election this year. There was a possibility the Quebec members might cause one but it was doubtful the Liberals wanted one, "after all that's been dumped on their doorstep."

Also addressing the meeting briefly were Lex Mackenzie, provincial member for York North, and William Curran, party chairman for York County.

"Just by accepting His favor, Jim. Good deeds are a natural characteristic of the believer in Christ, but they are not a means of salvation. The Bible makes this clear when it says: "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." (Ephesians 2: 8-10)

## To Control Markham Hunters

Vermiln in Markham Township will be able to rest easy for the next few months — at least from outsiders.

Last week, Markham Twp. Council agreed to a request from Game Warden Everett Harper that they reconsider a by-law presented last year, prohibiting hunting in the township between March 1 and August 31.

Mr. Harper said it was to discourage vermin hunters, who were able to trample over two lands for only a \$1 licence fee.

"We want a by-law to stop them," Mr. Harper said. "If we let them go through, the farmers will be in an uproar."

He said the farmers could kill any vermin (groundhogs, etc.) themselves, and that 22 rifles, mostly brought in by outsiders, were of more danger than shotguns.

Council agreed to pass the by-law without any further discussion.
