Antidote To Frustration

"Changes are coming so fast, one doesn't know what to believe." This statement reveals the frustration in the minds of many people. The apostle Paul wrote a letter to the Colossian church which was bombarded with false doctrines. In his letter he stated, "Don't let others spoil your faith and joy with their philosophies, their wrong and shallow answers built on mans, thoughts and ideas, instead of on what Christ has said." This is but one kind of frustration of men and women today.

Other kinds of problems that lead to inner conflict arise from the pace of modern life; problems at home, a boring job, financial worries, unemployment, feelings of guilt, and so the frustrations accumulate.

The answer to many of these can be resolved by obeying the command of Christ to "Come unto me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." The answer is not in escaping from the reality of the problems but rather in yielding ourselves to Christ who will become a fellow-partner in our life problems. He will bring us to hidden spiritual resources to cope with the conflicts constructively.

The poet expresses it in this way:

"Turn your eyes upon Jesus
Look full in his wonderful face,
And the things of this earth
will grow strangely dim,
In the light of his glory and grace."
