## Dismiss Attempted Theft Charge On Spelling Error

A spelling error made when an information against Francis Chism was drawn up caused Magistrate Russell Pearse to dismiss the charge of attempted theft in Richmond Hill Court, Tuesday.

Chism, of Richmond Hill was charged by Markham Township Police on December 20th when he was apprehended on the property of Robert B. Summer-ville, 16th Ave.

The information stated the property of 'Summerville' while a statement, made by the accused indicated the property of 'Sommerville', a one-letter discrepancy.

Sgt. Robert Hood, of the Markham Township Police, told the Court that he observed fresh foot tracks in the snow, and upon following them, located Chism hiding under a truck.

Sgt. Hood said he found a gas tank cover in Chism's pocket and was led to another truck where he found a tire and a rim. The goods were valued at about \$7.00.

Chism said that he was supposed to meet a friend at the scene, but when the friend failed to show up, he went onto the property by himself. The accused testified that he had left his car at the front of the prop-

erty, but moved it behind because he thought it would be the smart thing to do. However, Magistrate Pearse, in examining the two documents, said he could not be sure whether it was the same property and dismissed the charge.
