Deputy-Reeve Continues To Voice Opposition To Mun. Bldg. Project

The progress of the new \$300,000 municipal building project in the Twp. of Pickering continues to face opposition within the ranks of council. On Monday night, it was deputy-reeve Mrs. Jean McPherson who voiced strong criticism over the continuance of the program. She voted against the borrowing of \$225,000 for the venture and was joined by councillors Harvey Spang and Wm. Newman. The deputation by-law was passed on a 4-3 recorded vote.

The deputy-reeve attacked the proposal from three different angles. She charged that the project was premature and should be held up until after the Goldenberg report is made public. She suggested that it would not be practical to provide either water or sewerage services to the property and that soil tests had never been taken at the site. "Ignorance No Excuse" In Plant Site Change

The site change, proposed for the Burton woodworking plant on the Brock Road, south of Claremont, came up for discussion again on Monday night in Pickering Twp. Council.

Mrs. Dorothy V. Bishop, the prime complainant in the case, questioned in a letter, if a \$1,000 performance bond had been obtained prior to the issuance of a building permit. She also said that no approval for the Burton land division had been allowed by the Ontario Municipal Board.

Planning Director, John Faulkner said that the performance bond had been obtained. He said too, that when the land division application was approved by Planning Board in 1964, it was no longer necessary to obtain O.M.B. sanction.

Should Have Known Councillor Herb Wank said that there had been a certain amount of persecution connected with the Burton land transaction that was unwarranted.

Reeve Clifford Laycox noted that Mrs. Bishop was a qualified Property Development Consultant "and there was no reason why she didn't know what was going on."

The council agreed that Mrs. Bishop had every right to see a copy of the performance bond if she wished to come to the municipal office.

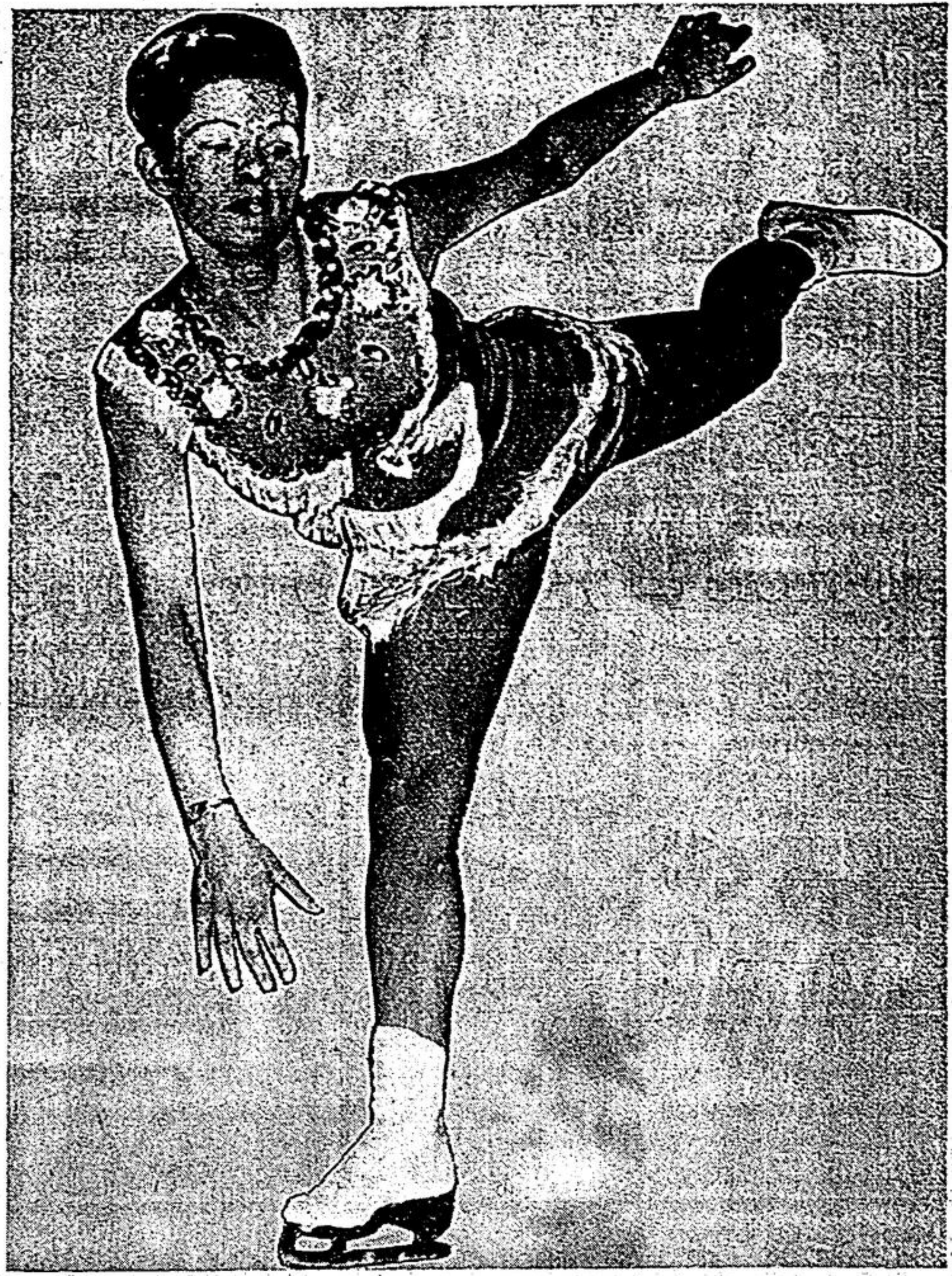
