Renovate Lawns In Spring

After the ravages of a long, hard winter, lawns need extra care in the spring, say horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

To maintain fertility and to ensure good growth of established turf, fertilizer should be applied as soon as possible. Special turf fertilizers such as 11:00 a.m.-Holiness Meeting 41.7.8, 12-6-6 or 6-10-4 are the 2:15 p.m.-Sunday School first figure of the formula represents the percentage nitrogen available. Lawns should have 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet. This will be supplied by applying 10 pounds of a 10-6-4 ratio, 14 pounds of a 7-7-7 ratio or 5 pounds of a 20-5-5 ratio. Care should be taken to avoid leaving unfertilized strips, or to overlap areas already covered.
