CHIROPRACTIC VIEWPOINT :

BURSITIS

Bursitis is rarely seen in youngsters and generally occurs in middle life and old age. Frequently, it is mistaken in its early stages for rheumatism. It can reach the stage where it actually incapacitates the patient because of the pain it causes.

What is this condition? It is an inflammation of the bursa, a little sac located near the attachment of certain muscles, such as around the knee and shoulder joints. The purpose of the bursa is to reduce friction between the muscles and ligaments, and the bones lying beneath (the same as oil is used between moving parts in a machine). Because of faulty body mechanics, there sometimes arises inflammation and irritation in the area of the bursa. This is the beginning of serious trouble.

In treating the condition, the first aim of the chiropractor is to relieve the inflammation. Next comes the correction of the body mechanics which gave rise to the condition. Finally, he restores to normal the mobility of the affected joint.
