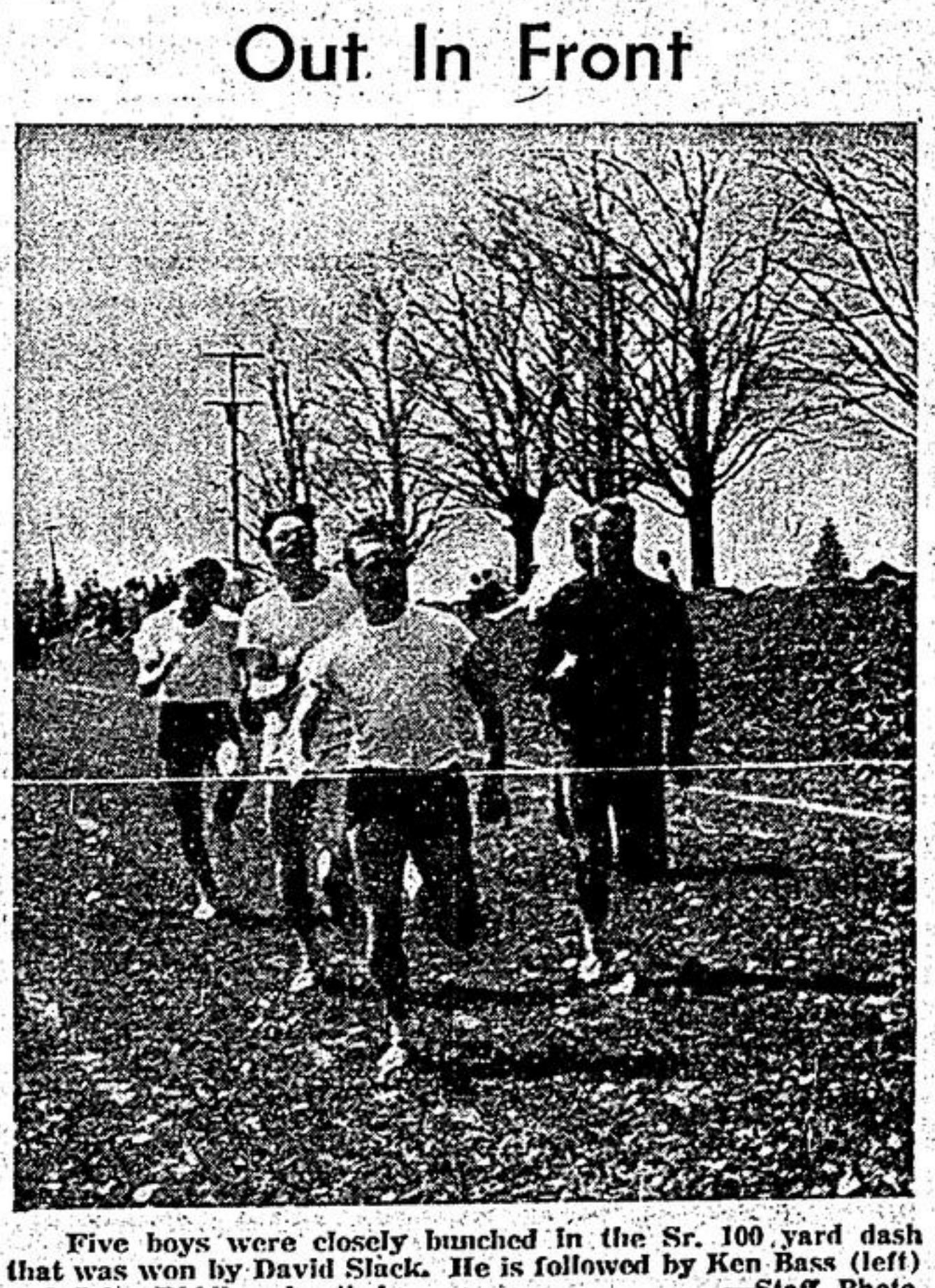
## Records Fall At High School Track and Field Meet
