In the past years the provincial police have relied on visual examinations when cars have been halted for inspection, while the Department of Transport has used its equipment for voluntary checks only. "This is the first time the two checking techniques have been used together." said Hon. Irwin Haskett.

Mr. Haskett said that the mobile safety check units will be moved each week to new locations throughout the province. He hoped that these checks would cause as little inconvenience as possible to drivers, but owing to the traffic accident toll, it was becoming vitally important to ensure that motor vehicles using our highways are in a safe operating condition.

Brake testing machines and front end alignment equipment will be used at each check site. The front end of each car will be raised off the ground, so that king pins, ball joints, steering mechanism, wheel bearing and tie roads can be examined. Exhaust system, lights and mirrors will also undergo examination. Cars that pass the safety check will be given windshield

The police believe that the more thorough examination made possible by the portable equipment; will reveal faults in cars that migh escape attention in a visual examination.

### III-Fated "Fame" Tangle Of Losses, Loans

Hold Inquiry At Milton Accountants outlined a tangld web of million-dollar losses and loans as a Royal Commission inquiry opened last week into the financial affairs of a farmers' co-operative.

Farmers' Allied Meat Enterprises Co-operative Ltd: spent \$2.633,282 of the \$2,634,736 it raised in its first 41/2 years' operation, said John C. Newland the accountant who has been checking FAME's books for the

Most of it - more than \$1,500-000 - was lost in an abortive attempt to buy a Burlington meat packing plant. F. W. Fearman Ltd. Nearly all the money came from selling FAME stock and debentures to 13,000 farm-

The Burlington company lost \$1.902,447 in the four years before FAME bought it last Aug. 31. This total includes \$371,837 depreciation that normally would have been charged against the operation. FAME agreed to pay \$2,500-

000 cash for the company's share capital. With this deal, the co-operative accepted responsibility for

\$1,000,000 in mortgages and \$1.878.938 in further liabilities as of last June 6. Weekly Loss The company lost money

every week on its operations from the time of the financial statement made June 6 to the time of purchase, Fearman's treasurer, David Ritchie, said.

FAME lost control of the company when the former owner, E. R. Gunner of London, Eng. repossessed it in early January. The co-operative had failed to pay the final \$1,000,000 it owed on the purchase price and the packing company had also horrowed another \$300,000 from

We have examined the books and records of the Village of Stouffvills and its local boards for the year ended December 31st, 1964.

We report on the financial statements of the Village as follows: RESULTS FOR THE YEAR

The details of this account and comparison to the 1964 budget are shown on the statement of revenue and expenditure.

The revenue from taxation compares with previous years as follows: 1964 ..... \$355,415.61 1963 ..... 341,785.42 1960 ..... 246,139.11

The taxes receivable including penalties on the current year's roll are \$13,076.78 as compared to \$17,000.36 at December 31st 1963. The collection of the current year's taxes and penalties represents 96.1% of the total tax roll including penalties added, as compared to 95.0% for the year ended December 31st 1963.

The collection of the current year's tax roll, arrears of taxes and penalties during the year represents 100.6% of the 1964 tax roll. We submit the following comments on certain of the items appearing on the financial statements:
