
The Main Intersection Of A Township Problem

Plan Shopping Plaza For West End Of Stouffville

A shopping plaza is proposed for the west end of Stouffville that, according to plans, will include an A. & P. Supermarket and several other stores.

The site is located on the north side of Main Street across from Coffey and Bartley Motors. It will be bounded by Winona Drive on the cast; Rupert Avenue on the north and Westlawn Cresc. on the west.

The Centre will be developed in four separate stages. Stage 1 will include the supermarket of 8.300 square feet and adjacent stores of 5,100 square feet. There will be parking for 165 cars. The total building area proposed for the site is 34,910 square feet with a parking area for 364 cars.
