The suicide, the runaway, the victim - all illustrations of someone's desire to escape reality. Dreadful we say and rightly so. National suicide statistics are striking. University campus prevalence of the same is alarming. Society should be disturbed.

"But wait! Are we escapists? No, we're not. Intention to take life. But are we seeking escape? Men drown their troubles in drink. Others indulge in immorality. Some bury themselves in business: Still others seek for pleasure.

How about us as Christians? How square are we facing the issues of life? How about the needy world, the social ills, the church responsibilities, the call of God to leave all and follow Him?
