A farm, owned and operated by Allen Ellicott, and in the Ellicott name for three generations, has been sold.

The final auction of livestock, implements, and furniture was carried out successfully Friday afternoon. The property and buildings were sold May 1st to Mr. Stan Malcolm of Toronto.

Auctioneer, Alvin Farmer said the high price paid for a grade cow was \$340, while heifers averaged \$140-145. The average on all livestock was

placed at \$225.

Mr. Ellicott told The Tribune that the farm had been in the family name since the late 1800's. He said that he purchased it from his dad in 1961.

Plans for the future have yet to be decided, but Mr. Ellicott said after the business of selling the farm had been taken care of, a lengthy holiday was in order.
