Full-Time Ambulance Service, Markham Tp.

Two privately operated ambulances will provide a 24-hour service to the whole of Markham Twp., according to an agreement approved by the council on Monday. The program was discussed in a committee meeting on May 19th with both owners, John Vance of Markham Village and David Holt of Richmond Hill in attendance. Mr. Vance will receive a retainer of \$400 per year and will serve the east half of the municipality. Mr. Holt will be paid about \$350 or 14.6 per cent of one-half the total fee. Richmond Hill and Vaughan Twp. will also share in the cost according to the number of calls made in 1964.

Father Rescues Dog Trapped In Thirty Ft. Gravel Test Hole

While his wife and three small children watched, a young Whitchurch Twp. father climbed down into a 30 foot deep hole north of the old Western Sand and Gravel pit, north of Lincolnville, and rescued the family's black Labrador Retriever on Sunday morning. Arthur Thompson spotted the dog at the bottom of the excavation after a lengthy search of the property. "Duke" had been missing for two days. A ladder was lowered into the hole and Mr. Thompson secured a rope around the dog's body. The animal was hauled to the surface by friends and neighbours at the scene. Aside from a couple of sore front paws, the dog appeared to suffer no other ill effects. It was extremely hungry and thirsty. Almost Gave Up. Mr. Thompson said that the area had been thoroughly searched on Saturday but without success. There are an estimated 50 test drill holes on the property. He said that during the night, he thought he could hear a dog barking in the distance and the following morning he went out alone to look again. "I had almost given up," he said, "but decided to take a closer look down the last hole." That's where he found "Duke."

Police To Charge Parents To Curb Acts Of Vandalism

Markham Village police intend to curb vandalism in the town and have orders to lay charges under provisions contained in the Child Welfare Act. The Act states that any child under the age of 16 years must be accompanied by a parent or responsible guardian between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. The ruling follows a rash of weekend damage that included smashed windows in the Dominion Store and Resor's Marmill; a broken guard rail fence at the Robinson St. bridge; broken road standards, street lamps and electric signs. To date, four youths, all under the age of 16 years, have been arrested.

Sgt. Wm. Vance told The Tribune that if a juvenile is caught, he will be taken home and his parents will be warned. If the youth is caught the second time, the parents will be charged and will be required to appear in court. A conviction makes them liable to fines of \$5 to \$10.

73 Dogs Destroyed

Open Sr. Citizen's Home To Public This Week-end; Dedication Service to be Held on Sunday at 2 p.m.

This weekend will be "open house" at the new \$275,000 Parkview Senior Citizen's Home in Stouffville as work on the one-storey structure enters its final stage.

The public is invited to view the interior of the new building from 2 to 9 p.m. The Service of Dedication will be held on Sunday at two o'clock.

It was just ten months ago that the first sod was turned to mark the beginning of the project and although hampered by some adverse weather conditions during the winter months, the contractor, C. L. Martin of Floradale, near Kitchener, maintained a close progress schedule.

The Home has 46 single and 8 double rooms and occupancies will be allowed in about one week's time. The administrator is Mr. Allan Wideman. He expressed satisfaction with the work done on the building and the co-operation he had received from both the contractor and the board, including — Newton Gingrich (chairman); Maurice Eby, Roy Nigh, Cecil Rescor and Joseph Wideman.

Many of the rooms in the Home have been furnished by Stouffville and district residents and organizations including — Stouffville Lions Club, Markham-Unionville Lions Club, Geo. To furnish a single room, the cost is \$262.50; a double room, \$550.00.

A 21 year old man was sentenced to two months in jail on Monday when convicted in Newmarket Court on a charge of failing to remain at the scene of an accident.

Wade Brown of Stouffville was charged by Ontario Provincial Police following an accident at Ringwood on April 30th.

According to evidence, a vehicle driven by Brown collided with one driven by Rev. Bruce Hisey, pastor, at Second Markham Baptist Church. Police said that Brown left the scene but was later arrested by P.C. Edward Grimshaw of Stouffville.

A charge of assaulting a police officer was withdrawn by the Crown Attorney.

In addition to the jail sentence, Brown's licence was suspended for 18 months.

The case was heard by Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake.

Council Returns \$100 Fee To Cycle Club

In the face of several complaints, Whitchurch Twp. Council has returned a \$100 licence fee that it had collected earlier from the Nortown Motorcycle Club of Willowdale.

By rejecting the permit charge, the members hope to discourage the cycle organization from holding a "scramble" near Musselman's Lake on Sunday, July 18th.

Two of the largest taxpayers in the Lake Area, Vern Davies of Cedar Beach and Stuart Patrick of Glendale had notified the reeve by telephone and voiced their objections to the Sunday competition.

It was admitted that by paying the fee, the club was automatically qualified to receive the licence. The council, in its latest move, however, indicated that the date had been cancelled.

Late Marye Sheehey Was Public School Teacher For 25 Years

The Goodwood community was saddened last week when news was received of the sudden passing of Mrs. Marye Sheehey, well-known resident in Uxbridge Twp. She was stricken with a heart attack at her home and died prior to the arrival of medical aid. She was 72.

Mrs. Sheehey established an amazing public school teaching record and, only three weeks ago received her 25 year pin at a gathering held in Sandford. For 20 years, she taught classes at the Fifth Line school on the Brock Road, retiring at the end of the June term in 1964. She was honoured by the board and community for her faithful service.

She was also active in the work of the United Church in Goodwood where she held a membership in the U.C.W. and the Women's Institute. She had lived alone following the sudden death of her husband in 1962.

Pastor E.R. Ingleby conducted the service on Friday afternoon in the Goodwood United Church with interment in the Uxbridge Cemetery. The pall bearers were Roy Cordingley, Walter Cooper, Dean Wagg, Austin McKay, Geo. Reid and Carl Priesty.

Driver Charged After Fatality

A 22 year old Unionville man has been charged by Markham Twp. police with criminal negligence causing death and dangerous driving following a fatal accident in Unionville on April 24th.

John McArthur was the driver of a northbound car that collided with one driven by Douglas Allison of Markham. Mrs. Allison died two days later in hospital.

McArthur was injured in the crash but was released from hospital two weeks ago and has since returned to work. P.C. Albert Hudson is in charge of the case.

Present Petition For Ward System In Whitchurch Twp.

A petition, requesting that a ward system be established in the Twp. of Whitchurch, was presented to the council at a meeting last week. It contained 180 signatures.

Mr. Pat Cashman of Musselman's Lake spoke in favour of division by wards and read from the Act pertaining to its formation. Reeve Ross Farquharson said that all names would be checked by the Clerk and if found correct, an application would be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for consent. In

Whitchurch a petition containing a minimum of 150 names is required. Councillor Alvin Farmer questioned Mr. Cashman concerning the benefits of a ward system. The spokesman replied that it was easier for candidates to cover a smaller area in their pre-election campaigns rather than the whole township. He said too that a councillor could provide more personal representation for ratepayers in a single ward than attempt to work on everyone's behalf across the municipality.
