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Record Holstein Sale Has \$1,528 Average; \$15,000 for Bull Calf

The Shore "Canadian Classic" Holstein Sale held May 21 at Glanworth realized a total of \$56,570 for 37 head, an average of \$1,528 each. This is the highest average ever made at a Holstein consignment sale in the south-western Ontario district centering on London. It compares with the previous record of \$1,026 established at this sale a year ago.

Top price of \$15,000 was paid by Richard Schleissner, of Dunlea Farm, Jerseyville, for the six-month-old bull calf, Oscar Royal Hope, consigned by R. F. Brown, Paris, Ont. The six nearest ancestors of this bull all have the top rating for type of "Excellent" and his seven nearest dams have an average yearly production of 23,479 lbs. of milk testing 4.0 percent butterfat. Runner-up in the bidding was Erik Andersen, Brantford, acting for an unnamed Italian buyer.

Highest price for a female was \$5,000 paid by Hooper Bros., St. Marys, Ont., to Harold W. Pearce, Tilsonburg, for Harriet Nettie Burke, a Very Good four-year-old daughter of the noted Rosafé Citation R., twice Grand Champion at the Mexican National Dairy Show.

Richard Schleissner paid \$4,150, the second highest price for a female, for the Grand Champion at the 1961 Middlesex Black & White Day. She was sold by R. H. Shore, Glanworth, Ont. Her baby daughter went to Hallward & Houck, Brampton, at \$450.

The highest price for a bred heifer was \$1,050 received by R. R. Dennis, Oak Ridge, Ont., from Bertram Stewart, Hornby, Ont.

Ten head were sold for export. One of these was a six-month-old bull calf bought by Rafael Escardo, Maranza, S.A., Lima, Peru, for \$1,500. He was sold by Ebdydale Farms, Githener, U.S. buyers were present from Michigan, Pennsylvania and Missouri.

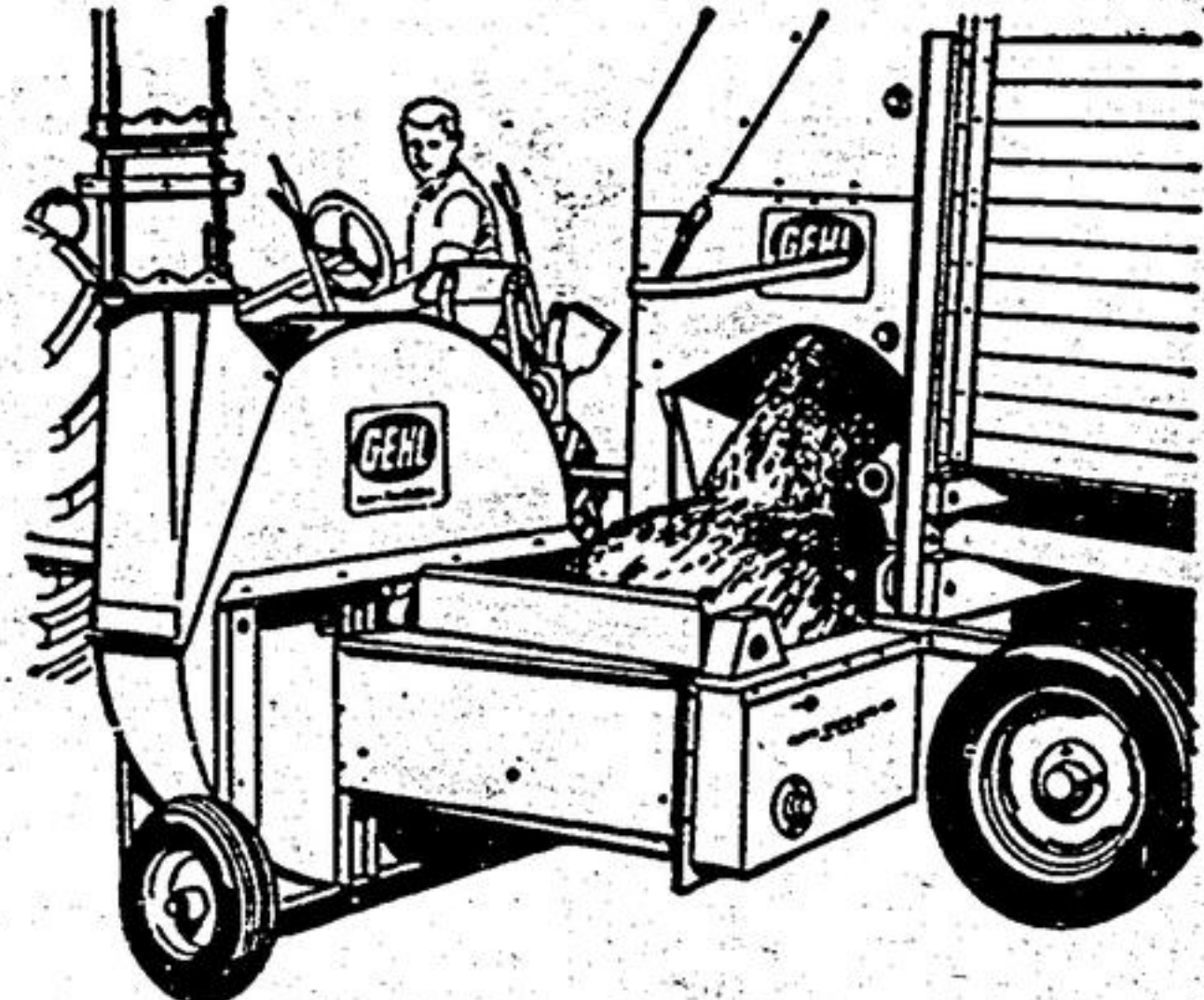
