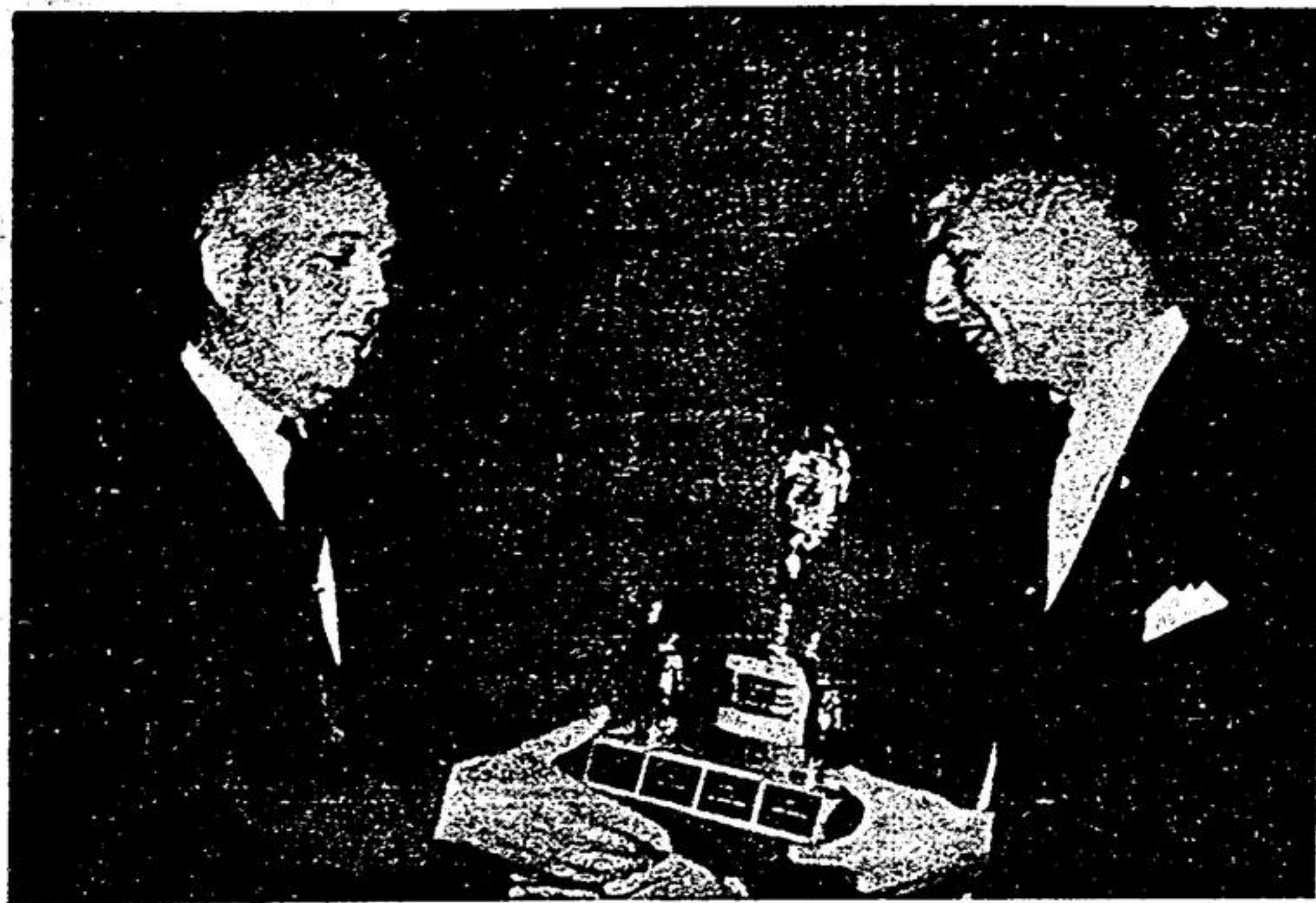


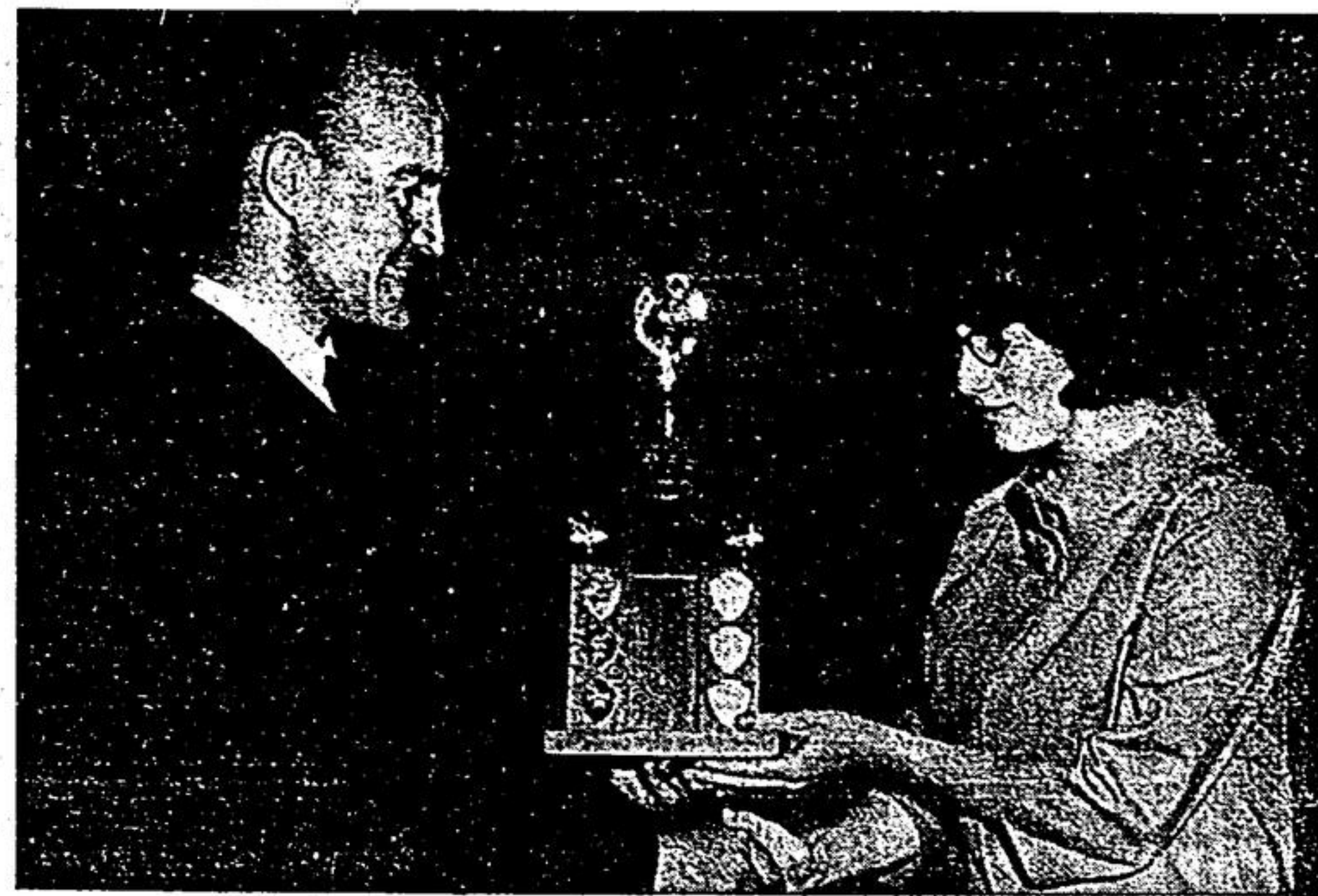
Top Student Athletes Honoured At H. S. Banquet

"We've had a marvellous year," commented high school Phys. Ed. instructor Jim Rehill at the conclusion of a very successful athletic banquet and awards presentation program on Friday night.

For two students in particular. It was a year that will always be remembered. Jim Hill and Donna Knox were selected as the top boy and girl athletes of the year and were presented with the Patrick Motors and I.O.O.F. Trophies.

Garney Henley, star halfback with the Hamilton "Tiger-Cats" was the guest speaker. He was introduced by staff teacher, Robt. Nielson.

The guest outlined some of his experiences dating back to his high school years. He said that in the United States, students were more readily recognized for their sports' abilities and scholarships were awarded on a basis of both athletic and academic accomplishments. He said that 75 per cent of U.S. players now performing in Canada had their B.A. degrees. "The 'dumb' football player is no more," he said.

Mr. Henley admitted that football taxed the physical prowess of a player. "It's a brutal game," he said, "but if you are in good physical condition, you can survive."

"I said that if I stayed alive for four years, I would quit," he said, "but it gets in your blood."

He was thanked by Mr. Rehill. Both students, Barbara Winn and John Willis, head of their respective Athletic Associations took part in the presentations and introduction of award winners.

With reference to Phys. Ed. staff teachers, Mrs. Almstedt and Mr. Rehill, grade 13 student, Jim Hill summed up the entire year's program when he said "we couldn't have done it alone."

Garden Hints

Iris beds and iris plants in flower beds and borders should be cleaned up as soon as possible, say horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Remove debris and dead leaves which have accumulated over the winter period. At this time, a dressing of a complete fertilizer such as 5-20-20 should be given.

Iris plants attain a great deal of their growth in the next six to eight weeks and therefore will benefit from plant food given now. Apply about 2 pounds per 100 square feet, and hoe or till into the surface of the soil.

Rock gardens should be cleaned up in the spring. This is important because accumulation of dead leaves and other debris may smother the small plants. Horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture say that any plants which have been heavily by the frost should be carefully pushed back into the soil. The whole area will benefit from a top-dressing of loam, leaf mold and sand. Attention should be given to the specific requirements from an application of well-rotted manure. Peat may be added to the top-dressing for acid loving plants, and agricultural limestone for plants preferring alkaline soil. The top-dressing should not be more than a half-inch deep.

Sleepy Hollow Golf Course Gets Face-Lifting

Alteration on five holes will make the Sleepy Hollow Golf and Country Club on Hwy. 47, northeast of Stouffville, one of the district's outstanding tests of golf and add \$100,000 to the value of the layout.

Work has been started on the course and the changes will include two completely new holes, three holes lengthened, six ponds and a self-contained watering system. The course will be lengthened from 3,135 yards to almost 6,800.

Golf pro Bert Turcotte said that the seventh hole will be one of the longest par fives in the district. It will measure 610 yards with a huge pond guarding the target area on the left.

Other changes will be made on the 10th and 11th holes.
