

# Road-Building Project Approved By Hydro For Pickering Township

Details of a road construction and improvement agreement between Ontario Hydro and the Twp. of Pickering have been released by Reeve C. W. Laycox and Hydro.

"The program will give us first-class roads around our prime industrial area," Reeve Laycox said, "and we could hardly be more pleased. This work, which otherwise might not have been done for many years, is also a clear indication that Hydro will more than pay its own way."

About 11,700 feet of existing township roads will be improved in preparation for the start of construction of Hydro's 1,080,000-kilowatt Pickering Generating Station, largest nuclear-electric plant on the continent. Another 2,000 feet of new road is to be built on Hydro property.

"Township officials will supervise the work," the reeve said.

## Dr. C. Vipond To Run For Fed. Liberals

Dr. Claude Vipond was unopposed on Friday night as the candidate to carry the Liberal banner in the federal Ontario Riding. His nomination, moved by Sam Hollingsworth and seconded by Terence Kelly, came as no surprise.

Prior to the meeting, held in Henry Street High School, Whitby, it had been suggested that he would get the nod. He is highly respected, both in the party and the riding.

A crowd, estimated at 500, gave him a rousing ovation.

Dr. Vipond said that a ruling majority for the government would be vital following the next election. "I cannot remember a time when the government had to face an Opposition so destructive, so belligerent and so irresponsible," he said.

## Seat Belts Could Have Saved Driver - Jury

The tires of a car in which a Brooklyn man died were all badly worn and two of them were completely bald, a Whitby coroner's inquest learned.

The hearing was into the death of 36-year-old Roy Barville Thomson, of R.R. 1, Brooklyn who died almost instantly when his car smashed headlong into a fully loaded oil tanker on Hwy. 7 on March 29.

Mr. Thomson's wife, Joan and his young son, Steven, were both badly injured in the smash. After retiring for a short time the jury ruled that Thomson died from serious injuries received in the collision.

The jury concluded that death may have been avoided if the driver had been wearing safety belts.

Cause of death, said Dr. R. M. Clark, pathologist at Oshawa General Hospital, was severe skull fractures to both sides of the head. The brain had been lacerated by the force of the collision.

The Building Inspector, Mr. Frank Prouse will now inspect each premise and rule accordingly.

"The farmers are not the problem," said councillor Herb Wank, "it is others who are causing the trouble."

"It will stop someone who thinks he's a farmer from building a shack on his property," agreed councillor Wm. Newman.
