

Woman, 83, Dies In Accident On Hwy. 48

An elderly Toronto woman was killed instantly on Thursday morning when a car, driven by her husband was hit broadside at the intersection of No. 48 Hwy. and 15th Ave., south of Markham.

Mrs. Margaret Brown, Olive Avenue was a front seat passenger in a car, that according to police, came out of a sideroad into the path of a northbound gravel truck.

Both vehicles veered into the ditch but remained upright. Mr. Joseph Brown, 82 was rushed

by Markham ambulance to Scarborough General Hospital. He suffered severe head and face cuts. The truck driver escaped injury.

Markham firemen were summoned to the scene when it was feared that spilled gasoline might ignite the wrecked auto. Police from Markham Village, Markham Twp. and Oak Ridges O.P.P. also attended. The victim was pronounced dead by coroner Dr. Blair Mitchell of Stouffville.

Sarah Ann Lott Dies In Ninety-first Year

On Saturday, June 11th, Mrs. Sarah Ann Lott of Dickson's Hill, passed away in the Brierbush Hospital, Stouffville. She was in her 91st year.

Mrs. Lott, the former Sarah Ann Hoover, was the daughter of the late Samuel Hoover and Susannah Wideman. In 1898 she was married to Phillip Lott who predeceased her in 1936.

For many years, she resided in Montreal, moving later to Toronto and then Dickson's Hill. She was identified with the Baptist Church.

It is reported that the pump is working overtime during the current dry spell on the Smalley potato farm. One neighbor complained that the noise often lasted until 3 a.m.

Residents said that the sound was similar to that of a motor go-kart. The problem was discussed briefly in council at a meeting on Monday night.

Road Supt. Stan Stack admitted that Mr. Smalley had laid an extension water line under the 2nd conc. road without his knowledge. "Had he asked my permission, I would probably have given it," he said, "the pipe was well placed."

The members asked the Clerk to write Mr. Smalley a letter, suggesting that he turn off his pump at a more reasonable hour.

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Youth Convicted Of Car Theft

Christopher Rhodes, 16, of Richmond Hill received a one year suspended sentence Tuesday when he was convicted of taking a motor vehicle belonging to Edith Irene Endean, Bayview Road.

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake learned from P.C. John McCague of the Markham Twp. Police that Rhodes was employed part-time by Endean Nurseries. The police officer said the youth had the keys to the car two weeks prior to his taking it.

Problem with Errant Son

A sixteen year old boy has been placed in custody to await sentence on three charges.

Douglas F. Billings will come before Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake June 22nd for sentencing on charges of driving while his license was under suspension; driving with an improper permit and consuming liquor while under age.

P.C. John McCague of the Markham Twp. police told the Court that the Thornhill youth had been driving his own car when apprehended. He said the accused had a permit, but it was not authentic. The officer added that no accident had occurred.

The youth, although not intoxicated, told a Markham Police Officer that he had consumed about three or four pints of beer.

Mr. Fred Billings, father of the accused, appeared in court and told Magistrate Hollinrake that he was having much trouble with his son. He said that the boy had quit school, but refused to work. He added that psychiatric treatment for the youth had failed.

The Magistrate ordered the boy held in custody until June 22nd for sentence.

Rhodes was stopped in the Musclemans Lake area, by Whitchurch Twp. Police and turned over to Markham Twp. Police.

Two youths with him were not charged.

"I will defer the passing of sentence for one year," said Magistrate Hollinrake. However the Magistrate added a number of stipulations the accused must agree to, or be called on at any time to face the charge.

A second charge of car theft was withdrawn by the Crown.
