Mr. Michael Sifton, vice-pres. of Toronto Airways, Ltd., Buttonville Airport, takes issue with an item in the June 3 Buttonville News column, sub-titled "Kitten or Tiger?" which reads: "Buttonville residents have been concerned over the fact that the flying club in their midst may become a commercial enterprise with heavier planes for charter."

He states that while there has been a flying club located at the field, this has been a small part of the operation.

"This airport," he emphasizes "has been a commercial enterprise since 1945."

"I assure you," he continued "that there will be no increased noise factor from the aircraft that we will be operating under the proposed charter, over that presently created by those aircraft which presently regularly utilize the airport facilities."

"Aircraft of a considerably higher weight factor than would be permissible under the proposed charter are presently using the airport, and have been for some time. Curiously enough, some of the older, smaller aircraft create substantially more noise than some of the larger aircraft."

On these last few days before official summer when you long for the lazy, warm sunny weather and all we get is cool days and wind, console yourself with the thought that this is perfect for writing exams. Remember the effort it was to gather your wandering wits for studying when June was hot and still? Exams are hard enough without heat . . . and the lazy days will be along soon.

Every once in a while someone wants to know how to make that colourful goopy clay that children love to play with and which will dry hard after modelling. Here it is again in case you want a batch for summer activities. Keep it in tightly closed jars, preferably in the refrigerator. One cup corn starch, half cup cold water, 2 cups table salt, 1/2 cup water and food colouring. Mix salt and 1/2 cup water in saucepan. Place over low heat, and stirring constantly, heat well (three or four minutes). Remove pan from heat. Immediately mix corn starch with half cup of water and add at once to hot mixture. Stir quickly. It should be like stiff dough . . . if it doesn't get doughy, return to heat and stir a minute longer. Turn out and knead a little, then use or store.
