Susan Nigh Wins At St. Lambert; Jumps 5'6"

Seventeen year old Susan Nigh, conc. 7 Markham broke her own personal record and



came within reach of the world mark when she posted a high jump mark of 5 ft. 6 inches on Saturday in the Canadian National Track & Field Championships held at St. Lambert, Quebec.

Prior to attaining this feat, her best height has been 5 ft. 4 inches.

In an effort to pick up additional points for the Don Mills Track Club, her coach, Lloyd Percival also entered Susan in the broad jump. Although unprepared for this competition, she placed third. Don Mills won the team title with an aggregate total of 134 points.

The next big meet for Susan will come in August when she enters the Eastern Canada Finals to be held at St. John, New Brunswick.

Bill Crothers continued his winning ways, taking the 440 on Friday and the 880 on Saturday.

Dogs Keep Barking But Owner Silent Court Is Told

Residents on 16th Avenue in Markham Twp., who were complaining about dogs barking, brought their accusations into Court Friday.

The dogs, on the property of Mr. Anthony Monk, have been, according to two next door neighbours, barking constantly.

Mr. Monk was subsequently charged with having care of dogs disturbing the peace, under by-law 1115 of Markham Township.

After hearing both complainants, Magistrate Russell Pearce found Monk guilty and fined him \$15 and costs.

Mrs. Gwen Farrell, who lives in the house immediately west of Monk's property, told the Court that her children can't sleep at night because of the constant noise.

No Answer
"I don't care if there's 50 dogs over there, just as long as they are quiet," she said.

Mrs. Farrell added she tried phoning Mr. Monk but couldn't get an answer.

Meanwhile, on the east side of the Monk residence, Mrs. Marie Cogar was having the same problem.

She said that her family has put up with the dogs for almost three years.

"We just can't stand it any longer," she added.

Mr. Monk, in defending himself, said that the only time his dogs bark is when some stranger crosses his land. He admitted that other persons have complained about the noise also.

Court costs of \$18 brought Monk's total payment to \$33.

Whitchurch Child Pulled From Well In Heroic Rescue

A 19 year old Aurora youth was credited with saving the life of a 2 1/2 year old boy Saturday in Whitchurch Township.

John O'Rourke, 15 Mary St., responded to pleas from Mrs. Millie Preston after her son, Allen, had fallen into a 33 foot deep well.

The accident occurred on the Preston property east of the 5th concession.

Whitchurch Township Police told The Tribune that the well was covered by a slab of wood, and weighted by two cement blocks. Somehow, the boy removed the blocks and tumbled in. There was three feet of water in the bottom.

Mrs. Preston flagged down Mr. O'Rourke as he drove by the residence. The teenager wrapped a length of rope around his waist and lowered himself down.

Allen was returned to the surface suffering from a scraped face and taken to York

County Hospital in Newmarket for treatment.

Whitchurch Police praised the teen-ager for his heroic actions.

Sgt. Neil Raven and P.C. William Nelson investigated.

Heart Attack Fatal to Golfer

A 47 year old Toronto man was stricken with a heart seizure on Sunday and died at the Willows Golf Course near Monoglia.

Mr. Neil McPhail was attended by Dr. Donald Smith of Stouffville and artificial respiration was applied immediately following his collapse, without success.

Markham School Area Office in New Location

New administration offices for Markham Twp. Public School Area No. 2 have been shifted from Richmond Hill to the now-vacant No. 11 school building north of Unionville on the 5th concession. Beginning July 1st, Mr. Wilfred Morley of Stouffville assumes the position of Administrator, succeeding Mr. Donald Beer of Brougham. His office secretary is Miss Karen Dean of Markham, a business college graduate.

Due to the pressure of appointments, all delegations wishing to meet in future with the board, must present their request in writing one week in advance.

Three Killed Near Vivian

Three persons died on Sunday when their car swerved into a deep ditch beside Hwy. 48 near Vivian.

Killed were Carol Carefoote, 19, her brother, Thomas, 12, both of Scarborough, and Paul Mayer, 19, of Toronto, driver of the car.

Witnesses said the north-bound auto pulled out to pass another, swerved on the west shoulder, across the highway on to the east shoulder and then down an embankment into the ditch.

The girl and Mayer were killed instantly. The younger boy died a few hours later in the Hospital for Sick Children.

Main Street Store Sold

The Carload groceries store on Main St., in Stouffville, has been sold.

The building has been sold to Mr. Peter Kwong of Unionville.

Mr. and Mrs. John Mathewson have operated the business for the past 18 years. When they acquired the premises back in 1947, they looked after the store entirely by themselves. Prior to the completion of the sale, their staff numbered five. Although their plans are not definite, Mr. and Mrs. Mathewson hope to remain as residents here.

The type of business to be operated by the new owner, has not yet been announced.

Queen Mother Hears Markham Padre Speak

Rev. D. R. McKillican of Markham, former Presbyterian Church pastor at both Markham and Stouffville occupied the pulpit in Knox Presbyterian Church, Toronto on Sunday afternoon.

Among the many hundreds seated in the congregation was a very special and distinguished visitor, Her Majesty, Queen Mother Elizabeth.

Her Majesty is the colonel-in-chief of the Toronto Scottish Regiment and Rev. McKillican is the regiment chaplain. Mr. McKillican received the Queen Mother at the church and escorted her to a front pew. In a simple ceremony, the old colours of the Toronto Scottish were retired. They had been replaced by new ones at a formal presentation on Friday.

Valuable farm land, bordering on the built-up area of Stouffville, has been placed in the hands of the A. E. LePage Real Estate Co., Toronto.

In total, the Harper, Brillinger and Ferguson properties comprise 194 acres with an estimated value of \$2,000 per acre or approximately \$400,000. Realtors Basket and Pegg have the listing.

Both the Harper and Brillinger farms have frontage on the C.N.R. line and represent a potential industrial zone. The Ferguson premises, on the south side of Main Street at the west end of town includes about 30 acres within the municipality and the remainder in Markham Twp. A portion of the Harper farm is also in Markham.

Reeve Win Timbers and Mr. Cec. Hendricks accompanied by a representative of the Basket and Pegg firm hope to arrange an appointment with the LePage Realtors in Toronto to discuss the sale promotion of sites located within Stouffville. Mr. Hendricks is chairman of the Stouffville Industrial Committee.

Pickering Recreation Chairman Resigns Post In Protest

Refusal by the Pickering Twp. Recreation Committee to provide financial assistance to teams in the Clarendon Community Softball League who do not compromise 100 per cent resident players, has brought a strong protest from the Committee Chairman and later, his resignation.

Earl Rowe, spokesman for the delegation informed the committee that for a single night, it cost the league between \$18 and \$20 to operate. He said that the township grant last year did not cover the umpire's fees. He said that each player had to pay to play and in addition, a \$15 team entry fee was charged.

He said that under the new ruling, not a single team in the league could qualify for the grant. He said that coaches were forced to fill out their lineups with a few imports since there were not enough resident ball players in the township for eight clubs.

Mr. Rowe presented a petition signed by nine men including Earl Goslin, (Brougham); Bill McDonald (Bay Ridges); Earl Rowe (Pickering); Les Wilson (Greenwood); Maurice Binsted (Clarendon); D. A. Beer (League Pres.); Howard Malcolm (Lg. Sec.); Grant Pascoe and Jack Britain (Executive).

Motion Upheld

The discussion that became rather heated at times was followed by a motion from Donald Hopkins and Terry Ryan that the petition request be not accepted. It was carried.

Mr. Beer who had put up a rigorous fight against the committee's decision, submitted his resignation and left the meeting.

Magistrate Alters Plea Of Youth

Squealing tires on pavement is not considered unnecessary noise as far as section 42, subsection 3 of the Highway Traffic Act is concerned.

David Carson Jones, RR 1, Stouffville, who appeared in Traffic Court Friday charged with making unnecessary noise, had his case dismissed.

P.C. William Gunn of the Markham Village Police told the Court that he observed Jones squeal his tires as he went through the three gears of the transmission. The officer said the tires squealed after each gear change. He added that Jones travelled south on Galsworthy then east on Wellington before being apprehended.

Not In Act

However, checking the Highway Traffic Act, Magistrate Russell Pearce said that section 42-3 did not cover noise from the tires. He explained that the section dealt with engine noise and fumes, but said nothing of the exterior of the car.

The Magistrate said that a law covering squealing tires may or may not be enforced by the Township under a by-law.

The Magistrate changed Jones' guilty plea to 'not guilty' and dismissed the charge.

Old Schools Not For Sale In Markham Twp. Area 2

Old public school buildings in Markham Twp. School Area No. 2 are not for sale, at least not at the present time.

This was a decision of the trustees at a recent meeting after a letter was received from the Community Club at Cedar Grove.

The members of that organization are anxious to retain their school as a centennial project. They would like to purchase the building and rent it back to the board as long as its usefulness as a classroom is maintained.

"Cedar Grove residents feel strongly about preserving the schoolhouse," the letter read; "it was the centre of community activity for many years and we wish to keep it this way."

The board, following a discussion on the matter, decided that neither the school at Cedar Grove nor any other in the area would be sold at present. The trustees agreed, however, to review the issue again in the fall.
