In This Corner

It looks like a bus, it rides like a bus, but it's not a bus. It's a mobile home, and although it maintains its buslike features and shape, this vehicle can be lived in... quite comfortably.

Strictly a hobby, Mr. Burland spends most of his spare time converting the bus. His wife, Eva, also takes an active interest in the project.

Sitting proudly in Mr. Burland's back yard, the 1951 International bus is presently undergoing some drastic modifications.

Bob Burland got the idea of converting a bus after two years of towing a trailer behind his car.

"No matter how good your hitch is," he said, "trailers still bounce around the roadways of a bus, he came upon a dealer in Scarborough who sold them.

Although he had never driven a bus before, Mr. Burland bravely climbed behind the controls and maneuvered it to the most likely testing ground... The MacDonald Cartier Freeway.

The traditional yellow exterior is missing, and is now covered with a two-toned turquoise and white. The interior passenger seats have been removed except for the one immediately behind the driver's seat.

The Burland family, including Mr. and Mrs. Burland, two of their three children, and three youngsters from the Children's Aid Society, will have no trouble finding sleeping quarters.

Bob has installed a three-way electrical system for his lights, including six volt, 110 volt and propane. The stove, situated near the rear of the bus, is also propane controlled.

Beneath the stove is the refrigerator. On the opposite wall is the sink, complete with a hand pump and running water.

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Immediately behind the lone remaining passenger seat is a bed, while directly across from it are bunk beds.

Mr. Burland hopes to have the upper bunk built in such a way that it folds partially into the wall and partially into the ceiling when not in use.

The seats are covered in yellow upholstery, and padded with foam rubber. Bob said that a lot of shopping around was required to find the rubbers he finally picked it up at a Canadian Tire Store.

Mr. Burland is pondering the idea of re-tilling the floor. At present, the holes still show, marking the spots where the original seats were situated.

One of the most important and unique features of the bus, will be a two-way radio. Familiar with their operation, Bob feels that in case of emergency the radio will provide a direct link to different receivers.

The vacation, to start in August, will be a complete circuit of Ontario, with stop-off points at Renfrew, Pembroke, North Bay, Kirkland Lake, Timmins, Chapeau, Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury, Parry Sound and a number of smaller parks.

Bob chose the stop off spots by referring to an Ontario Parks guide. He looked for the places that offered the most facilities, such as camp site, water, nearby restaurants, etc.

With the completion of the vacation in August, Bob is hoping to get down into the United States next year.

Listed as a commercial vehicle, the owner is required to have his name visible on the bus. Mr. Burland will print his name in two inch letters near the door, and believe it or not, this club looks good.

The young ladies that comprise Stouffville's only "powder-puff" ball team have finally started batting balls rather than just eyelashes.

The girls play all their home games on Thursday nights at the park, beginning at 8 p.m.

Coach John Nesbitt and able-bodied assistant Fred Moore are to be commended for the way they have this club "shaped" up.
