WEDDING

SABATA-MAGEE

A wedding of local interest was solemnized at Yorkminster United Church, Willowdale, on June 26, 1965, when Marilyn Joan Magee, younger daughter of Mrs. George Magee, former wife of Buttonville and Leopold Karl Sabata, son of Mrs. Rosa Kobsa of Vienna, Austria, were united in marriage.

Rev. Egerton Young officiated at the double ring ceremony; Mrs. D. Maddock played the organ, and the soloist was the bride's cousin, Mrs. Murray Young. Flowers at the altar were arrangements of white and tangerine chrysanthemums.

The bride was given in marriage by her brother, Walter Magee, and entered the church to the hymn "Praise My Soul the King of Heaven." Her gown was satin peau de soie, with fitted bodice, bateau neckline and elbow length sleeves; a detachable chapel train fell from the waistline of the long bell-shaped skirt, and appliques of seed pearls added elegance. A Queen Anne crystal tiara held her fingertip veil, and she carried a crescent of mums, white, rose and tangerine.

Bridal attendants Mrs. Yvonne Mathieu, who was her sister's matron of honour, Mrs. Walter Magee, her sister-in-law and Joanne Pollock, a niece who acted as junior bridesmaid, wore similar ankle length gowns of satin peau de soie. FARM REPORT

A. A. Wall, Agricultural Representative for York County, Newmarket

Last week's rain was a real life saver for crops in York County. Amounts varied with about half an inch at Newmarket and Bradford, almost an inch at Mt. Albert and about an inch and a half at Stouffville. The fall was even heavier south of Stouffville in Markham and Scarboro. The rain was heavy enough over the whole county to give grain, corn, pasture and vegetables a good shot in the arm. We can only hope that it can be repeated each week for the rest of the growing season.

I have been estimating that the hay crop this year is down about a third from normal. However, from many visits to farms last week, I think the drop is closer to a half. Part of the drop was caused by dry weather, but winter kill had a lot to do with it as well. Stands were thinned out badly on a lot of fields, with dandelions and daisies moving in to fill up the gaps.

After a light first crop, the question is what can be done to make up the second cut. Fertilizer is the most obvious possibility. Normally, a good belt of 0-20-20 or 5-20-20 will help to bring second growth along quickly. This is probably a good idea this year too, but the shortage of moisture puts a weak question mark on it. It takes a fair amount of moisture to move phosphorous and potash into the root area where it can be used.

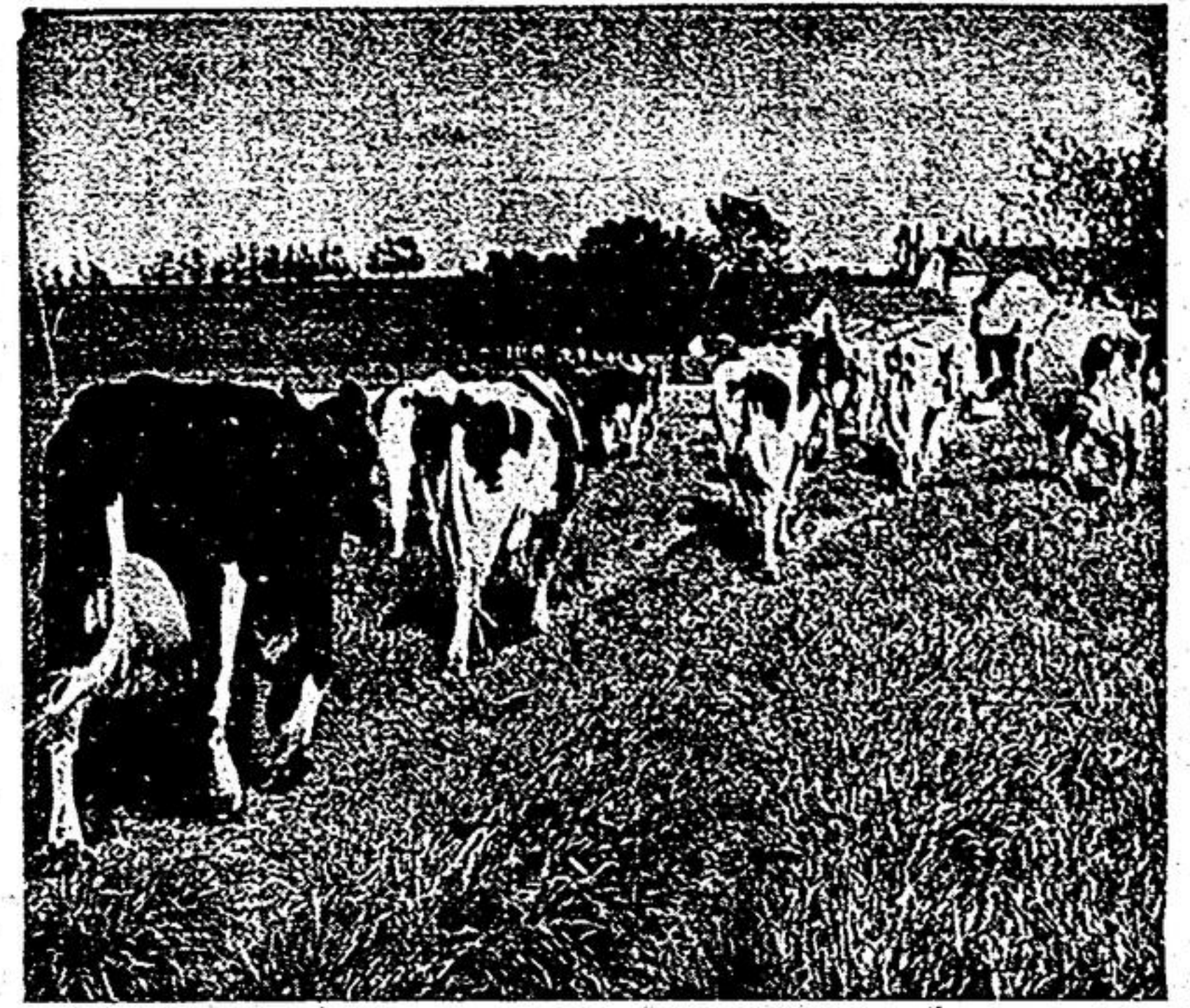
However, fertilizing now with a low nitrogen ratio won't do any harm, and even if it doesn't get enough rain to boost the second crop, it will still be there to be used later.

With a high nitrogen fertilizer on grass stand, rain is definitely needed to make it work. If it doesn't get the rain, a fair amount of the nitrogen may be lost. Using nitrogen on sod in July is a fairly long gamble.

There is a good session on beef cattle coming up next Wednesday. July 14th is the date of the Beef Field Day at O.A.C. It starts at 10:30 in the morning at the Beef Feeding Unit at the Arkell Farm. Afternoon features will be on feedlot diseases, housing and management practices. The speakers on these topics will be Dr. R. A. Curtis, Prof. J. Pos and Dr. T. D. Burgess. Members of the Beef Improvement Association in York County will be especially welcome at this field day.

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
