An estimated 800 persons visited the parlours prior to the service and floral tributes numbered forty-five. Few people in this area had accumulated such a wide circle of friends due mainly to Mr. Risebrough's friendly attitude towards everyone he knew and met.

Prior to his retirement here in Stouffville, two years ago, he farmed both at Agincourt and Markham Twp. He was identified with the United Church.

Besides his wife, the former Mary Cole, he is survived by one daughter, Marion (Mrs. Charles Minaker) of Stouffville. He also leaves two nieces that he raised as children, Grace (Mrs. Ray Wood) of Goodwood and Nellie (Mrs. Dan Kerr) of Agincourt.
