## Beaverton Farmer Head Of Milk Marketing Bd.

The appointment of a 14-man board to handle milk marketing in Ontario was announced today by Hon. Wm. A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture. The establishment of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board is a further step toward the implementation of the Ontario Milk Act passed during the last session of the provincial legislature.

The new board will function under the Chairmanship of George R. McLaughlin, well-known Beaverton dairy farmer whose appointment was announced a few days ago. Eventually, the marketing board will handle the marketing of all milk in the province. Administration of the new act is under the supervision of the Ontario Milk Commission headed by Chairman George McCague.

In announcing the personnel of the new marketing board Mr. Stewart stressed that these producers represented dairy farmers from all parts of the province. They have been selected because of their broad experi-

ence in the industry and the wide divergence of their interests.

Vice-chairman of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board will be Orvil Guy of Winchester who is President of the Concentrated Milk Producers' Association of Ontario. Mr. Guy has been a director of that organization for many years.

Mr. Stewart said he hopes the new board will begin operating immediately although he feels it may be some time before it can take over the marketing of all milk. Time will be needed for the acquisition and organization of staff and establishing operating procedures. However, the Minister expressed optimism in the ability of these dairy farmers to carry out the intent of the new Milk Act and organize the orderly marketing of all milk in the province to the benefit of both producers and consumers. "The dairy industry is vital in our agricultural and general economy," said Mr. Stewart. "And the new Milk Act recognizes its importance."

## Suggest Enlarging Victoria Street Pumping Station

Town councillor, Ken Betz has suggested that serious consideration be given to increasing the capacity of the pumping station at Victoria Street to meet the needs of increased development in the west end of Stouffville.

Councillor Betz, speaking at a recent meeting, said that some work would be required to the present station that had been in operation for the past nine years.

Mr. Betz' thinking was supported by engineers Hisey and Barrington in a letter to council. He recommended that additional land be purchased in the area of Victoria Street and Orchard Park Blvd. for the future installation of an above-ground station.

"Something will have to be done," said councillor Betz, "the whole west end of town depends on it." He noted that should there be residential or industrial growth in that section the sewerage flow would automatically be increased. "Someone will have to make the move and I don't believe that the council of 1966 should be expected to take on this project without some earlier preparation," he continued. "We've been given the warning that we must prepare for the future."

Road Foreman, Elgin Wagg noted that since the opening of the Senior Citizen's Home, the sewerage flow had increased noticeably.

Deputy-Reeve Ken Laushway agreed that a new station and more land would undoubtedly be required but he suggested that an auxiliary pump on the present site would relieve any immediate problem.

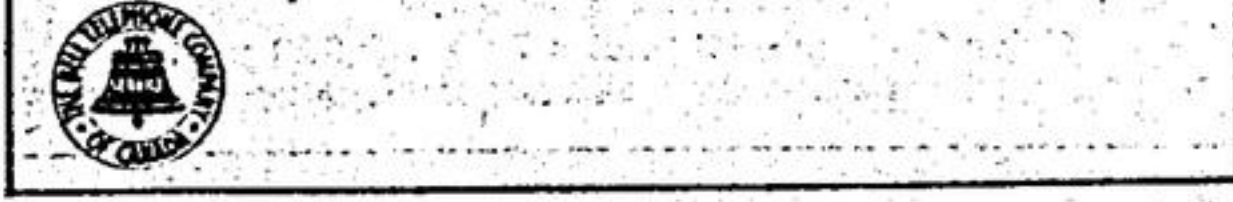
