

By RON WALLACE On June 24th, in this column, I distinctly remember writing an article regarding the poor attendance at the local baseball games. Today, with baseball drawing to a close for the season, I

am convinced that I laid the blame on the wrong shoulder.

You'll recall I accused the locals of sitting on their derrieres in front of a TV set, with no interest whatsoever in what was happening in the local ball loop.

No, the reason for the poor crowds is not the disinterested spectator, not is it the two local teams, the Juniors and Intermediates. The fault lies, we believe, with the organizers of the leagues. They call themselves organizers, but, I haven't seen a shred of organization this summer. That is mainly the reason for our sports page Where it should

carry long, detailed stories of how our local boys are doing, it carries reports on teams as far away as Brooklin. Port Perry, Richmond Hill, and Newmarket. The reason is simple. Every newspaper is supposed to have a sports page, and, if the local ball officials are not interested in contributing, then, we will have to go elsewhere for our news. Which we did. Things were looking pretty good at the start of the ball sea-

son. Members, determined to have complete coverage of the games, brought in a neatly typed schedule, for the first month, with solemn promises that the rest of the itinerary would be sent in later. Stouffville was trying to get an Intermedate team going again

after an absence of three years, and everything was going nicely until another team, Little Britain, dropped out of the league. That did it. The schedule that hung on our reference list became as useless as ice cream in Alaska. After the withdrawal of that one team, we had to depend on

the ball players themselves to supply the information for upcoming games, and some of the answers we received would make Davey Jones roll over in his locker. "As far as I know, we should have a game between Monday

and Friday, providing the opposition shows up, or if they feel they want to play, or if there's a blue moon in the sky," they answer. From another source, "no, we're not in the playoffs, uh. yes,

we are, well anyhow, we should be.' Or, "think we can get coverage on the game? When? Oh,

sometime, before Labor Day." Or we would ask, "is there a game tonight?" And receive something like, "wal, I'm not sure. Yes, I'm on the team, but

nobody's told me anything." And so it goes. Now, how can we be expected to get fans out to the games, if the players don't even know whether they're

playing themselves? We can't and we don't. Now that playoffs have begun in numerous centres in the area, we could attend three games a night, seven nights a week, and still not cover them all. But they would all become secondary

On last week's sports page, we have ball games from Markfourth and one in the fifth to is Thursday (tonight) at the ham, Claremont, Brougham, Port Perry and Goodwood. We also make mention of teams from Squire's Beach, Omagh, Heron Greensville, and Brooklin. Half those places, I've never heard of before. Out of town baseball gets better coverage than a good

Beatle Press Conference. In town, baseball is almost unheard of. This of course, makes the local sports reader rebel. Why, he asks, should we print from all those places, and not say a word about Stouffville? Now you know.

The men responsible for these out of town ball clubs have an Interest in their teams, and they want people to see them play. So, they advertise, through town talk, window posters, and the newspaper media, . . . and they get results. Last week, more than 300 spectators turned up for a game in Claremont. Their stands won't even hold that many, but some sat, some stood, and all stayed for the duration of the game.

In Stouffville, it looks like the Bloor Street subway station the way people come and go. If the lights are on, they'll meander down to the park to see what all the commotion is about, but once they get there, they're not sure who's playing, what league it is, or what the score is, so, they continue their stroll to other points.

There's another reason why I say the spectators are not to blame for this. Checking the back files, I noticed a number of sports heads that read '600 See Clippers Win, or 'Packed House As Playoffs Begin.' This is hockey, in the cold of the winter, where on some occasions, the snow is so deep, the arena doors won't open properly. This is when people should want to stay at home watching T.V., where the fireplace is more exciting than Diana Dors in a bikini. Yet, in they stroll, by the hundreds, paying a set admission, that increases during the playoffs.



> It all boils down to the fact that the organizers of any sport must have some interest in what they're doing. As far as I can see, there is more interest in the Terry-town Turtle Races than there is in baseball here.

> Therefore, speciators, you have been wrongfully accused, and you are now rightfully reprieved. There is no hope this season for baseball in Stouffville. All is lost, as they say.

> But, fret not, winter is coming, and perhaps next season, who can say for sure, they might place someone with a little responsibility in the organizer's chair.

You want to know if there are any more games this season? Don't ask me, I'm only a reporter.
