On The Farm Front...

Treatment Is Important For Best Wheat Results

(Mr. R. Bolton, Associate Agricultural Representative for York County, Newmarket)

Winter Wheat

Genesee and Talbot are the recommended varieties for this area. The results of the 1964 test plots do not show a significant difference in yield per acre. Talbot is slightly shorter and has a small advantage in straw length.

The general fertilizer recommendation is 300 lbs. of 5-20-20 on light soils and 300 lbs. of 5-20-10 on clay soils. The best time to apply extra nitrogen is in spring before growth starts.

The seed should be treated with a combination fungicide-insecticide to control diseases and wireworm. These chemicals are available at most feed and seed mills.

Wheat protectant: Adding a pound of wheat protectant to each 10 bushels of grain as it is stored, is good insurance against damage from granary weevils. This material is harm-

less to all classes of livestock. It can be placed on top of a load of grain and it will get mixed in as the grain is elevated to the bin.

Driver Said Impaired: Fined \$500 In Court After Fatal Accident

A 23 year old Toronto man was fined \$500 and costs Monday after being convicted of impaired driving.

Glen J. Markowski was the driver of a car that went out of control on Highway 48 and killed a passenger, Allen Lachocki June 20th.

Markowski pleaded guilty to the charge.

P.C. Clifford McBride of the Oak Ridges OPP told the Court that he investigated the fatal accident and said the passenger was pronounced dead at the scene. The officer said the accident happened south of Ballantray near the Vandorf Sideroad in the early morning hours of June 20th. He said he measured a skid mark along the west shoulder of 404 feet. The car shot across the highway to the east shoulder and flipped over.

Markowski suffered only minor injuries in the accident.

Dr. Blair Mitchell took the injured man back to his office where a blood test was taken. Dr. Mitchell said that 1.9 parts alcohol per thousand were found in the blood stream.

The doctor said that Markowski was unsteady on his feet and did considerable yelling and shouting.

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake allowed the man 30 days to pay the fine.

Besides the fine, Markowski's driver's license was suspended by the Department of Transport for six months.

57% FAVOUR DEATH PENALTY, SURVEY REVEALS

Mr. John H. Addison, Member of Parliament for York North, has recently completed conducting a survey in his riding on the subject of capital punishment. His constituents were asked, by means of a private ballot, to indicate their opinion concerning the controversial issue which is slated for debate in the House of Commons.

The results showed 57% of those polled to be in favour of the retention of the death penalty, 41% felt that capital punishment should be abolished and 2% had no strong opinion either way.

Approximately five hundred households and many organized groups responded to the poll. Of those in favour of retaining the death penalty, many felt that it should be retained only for certain crimes, such as the murder of police officers and statutory rape. Other indicated that electrocution and the gallows should be replaced by new methods of punishment.
