See Horsepower Threshing At Pioneer Village

Visitors to Black Creek Pioneer Village in Metro, this coming Saturday, Sept. 4, will have an opportunity to witness two pre-Confederation crafts being plied—threshing by horsepower and cooperage.

The threshing of grain demonstration will be held between 2 and 3.30 p.m., and the art of making and repairing barrels and buckets, known as cooperage, will be shown between 10 and 12 noon and from 1 to 4.30 p.m.

Horsepower threshing was extensively carried out on pioneer farms during the first half of the 19th century, being supplanted by steam power during the 1860s. The horsepower threshing machine used at Black Creek Pioneer Village is regarded as one of the earliest of its type in Canada—used between

1835-1840. The same method was also employed for well-digging, chopping and many other farm chores.

The cooperage demonstrations will be given by William Klees of Downsview in a temporary cooper's shop set up on the grounds. Mr. Klees has been a cooper for 57 years, and now plies his trade at Pioneer Village. The unique crossroads community is being developed by the Metro Toronto and Region Living Village of the pre-Confederation era for the interest and conservation of the public, as well as a means to conserve and recreate early Canadian pioneer life.

Black Creek Pioneer Village is open weekends and holidays from 10 to 8 p.m.

York North M.P. Opens Mt. Albert Post Office

John Addison, Member of Parliament for York North officiated at the opening of the new \$23,546 post office at Mount Albert on Friday evening.

Measuring 37 feet by 31 feet the one-storey structure faces Centre Street. It has a concrete foundation and frame construction with an exterior finished in brick. Interior finishes consist of exposed decking on the ceiling, plywood walls and vinyl asbestos tile on the floors. Heating is supplied by an oil-fired furnace. There is a truck yard and loading platform at the rear of the building providing 800 square feet of working space.

Plans and specifications were prepared in the Toronto District Architect's office of the Department of Public Works.

I.M. Saunders, District Architect, was responsible for supervision of the work.

Fall Tree Planting Possible But Risky

Zone Forester John Griffiths, at Maple, offers some advice to landowners who may be planning to plant trees on their property this fall.

Fall tree planting is best restricted to well sheltered sites and light, dry, sandy soils. Heavy clay soils or exposed locations are not suited for fall planting.

Early spring is actually the preferred time for tree planting and the two weeks period or longer before the buds commence growth, is best. At this time of year the root growth is active and the young trees become established quickly. It is especially important to plant the broad-leaved trees before the buds swell, as otherwise the newly-formed leaves may wither and fall off. Subsequent leaves formed from secondary buds will be poor. Mr. Griffiths stated that the best period for spring planting only lasts for 2 to 4 weeks involving concentrated activity and if enough time is not available fall planting may be necessary.

Hazards which should be considered in fall planting are threefold:

- (1) There is a danger of frost heaving, especially on heavy clay soils. Freezing and thawing of the soil causes expansion and contraction and literally squeezes newly planted seedlings out of the soil. In the spring you may well discover your seedlings lying on top of the ground. While light sandy soils are not normally subject to frost heaving, this condition can occur.
- (2) Drying by wind and sun may cause "winter-killing."
- (3) Root decay may occur on heavy or wet soils.

Should the decision be made to carry on fall planting, the operation should be carried out just before the fall period of root activity begins. This means that the landowner should plant in late September so that the tiny roots can grow and establish contact with the soil in the month of October. Broad-leaved trees, because of their greater root growth in the fall, are more adapted to fall planting than evergreens. Also deciduous conifers, such as larch are more adaptable to fall planting.

The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests sells tree seedlings for reforestation or windbreak planting to eligible property owners who have land of 2 acres or more in size (exclusive of buildings). Persons interested in planting either this fall or next spring, should place their orders for trees now. This can be done by contacting the nearest Department of Lands office.

Drove While Licence Suspended; Fined \$200

Ronald Glentworth, who had been convicted of impaired driving on August 16th, was back in Court Monday.

Charged with driving a vehicle while his license was under suspension, the Gormley area man was fined \$200 and costs, and given an additional six month suspension.

Glentworth was arrested by the Ontario Provincial Police in Markham Township August 26th, 10 days after his license had been taken away for the former charge. He had been involved in a minor property damage accident.

Because Glentworth was not the registered owner, Magistrate Russel Pearce could not impound the automobile.

A 90 day jail term was offered as an alternative to the fine.
