Four Townships Discuss Holding Deer Shoot

Representatives of the Towns of Pickering, Uxbridge, Reach and Scott will hold a joint meeting to discuss the benefits of an open deer shoot in each of the municipalities.

Such a move was approved by Pickering Twp. council on Monday night following a personal interview with Mr. Wayne Danby, an official of the Dept. of Lands and Forests. Some members, including councillor Harvey Spang expressed misgivings over the venture but admitted that crop damage caused by deer was extensive in some areas.

Mr. Danby said that last year, 4 deer had been killed on the roads in Pickering and 121 had died in Ontario County. He suggested that the boundary line should be drawn at the 5th conc. or possibly No. 7 Hwy. Only shotguns would be used and dogs would not be allowed. Councillor Wm. Newman said that the matter had been discussed by the Pickering Game Committee and it was felt that a deer shoot should not be considered unless all adjoining townships were also agreeable. Mr. Danby said that Scott Twp. council had expressed favour with the idea.
