The Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority has announced that the 9th annual Pioneer Festival will be held Saturday, Sept. 25 at the Black Creek Pioneer Village, Jane Street and Steeles Avenue.
The day-long program of events will include competitions in musket shooting, horseshoe pitching and sheaf pitching, Indian dancing, Scottish dancing, folk singing, a spelling bee, and a stage show. There will also be 27 various demonstrations of pioneer arts and crafts including churning butter by dog power, sausage making, sauerkraut making, cooping, wool dyeing, bread baking, weaving, candle making and sheaf binding. On sale will be home baked goods, handicrafts, herbs, sausage, honey and preserves.
Admission to the Festival is the regular Black Creek Village charge of \$1.00 for adults and 25 cents for students and children.
