

Crash at Green River Bridge Blocks Traffic on No. 7



Traffic on No. 7 Hwy., at Green River had to be re-routed for two hours on Thursday afternoon following a collision between two gravel trucks on a narrow bridge. Damage to the vehicles, both nearly new, was estimated at \$16,000.
