Mrs. Beula Jones visited Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bennett of Zephyr on Saturday evening.

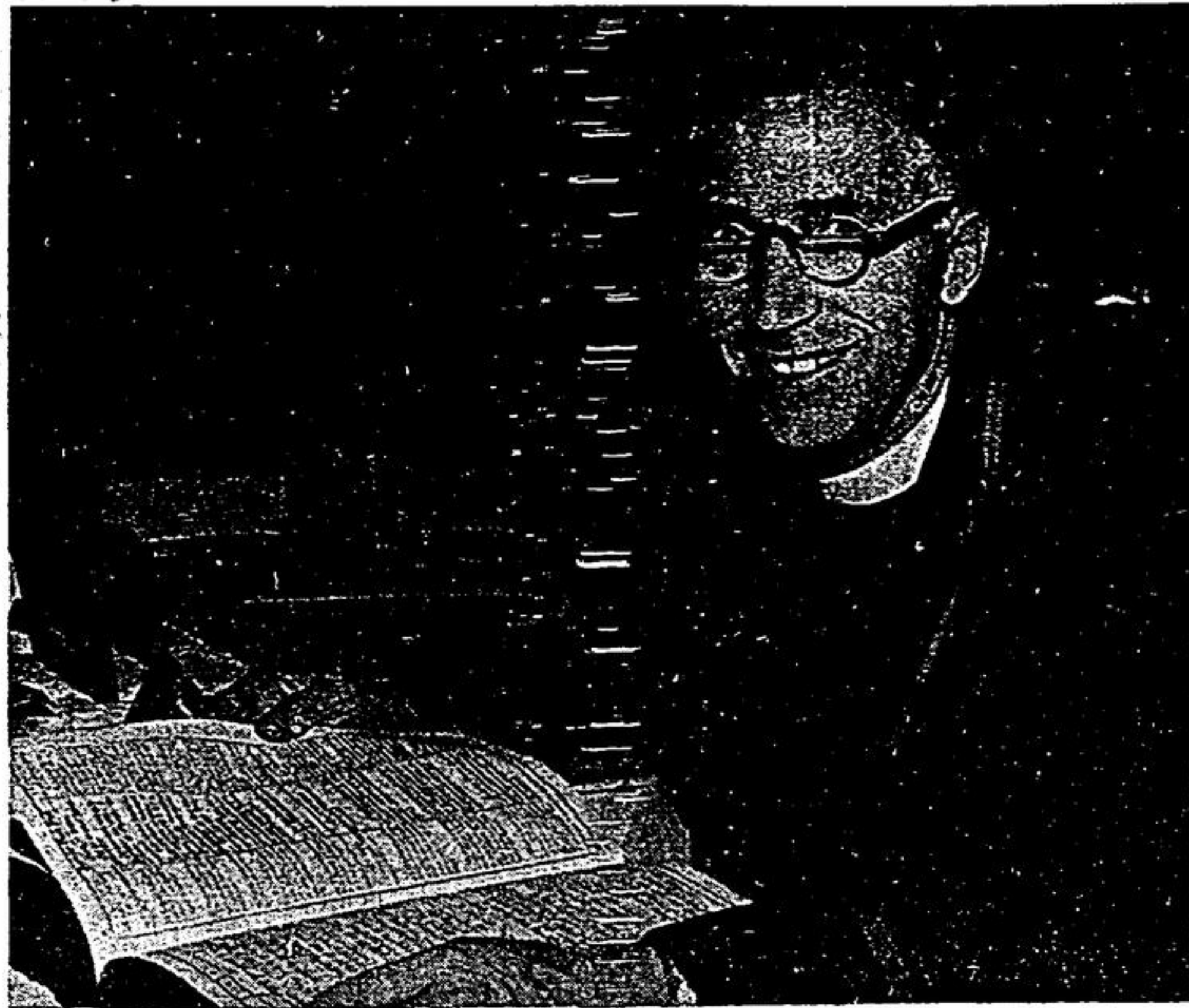

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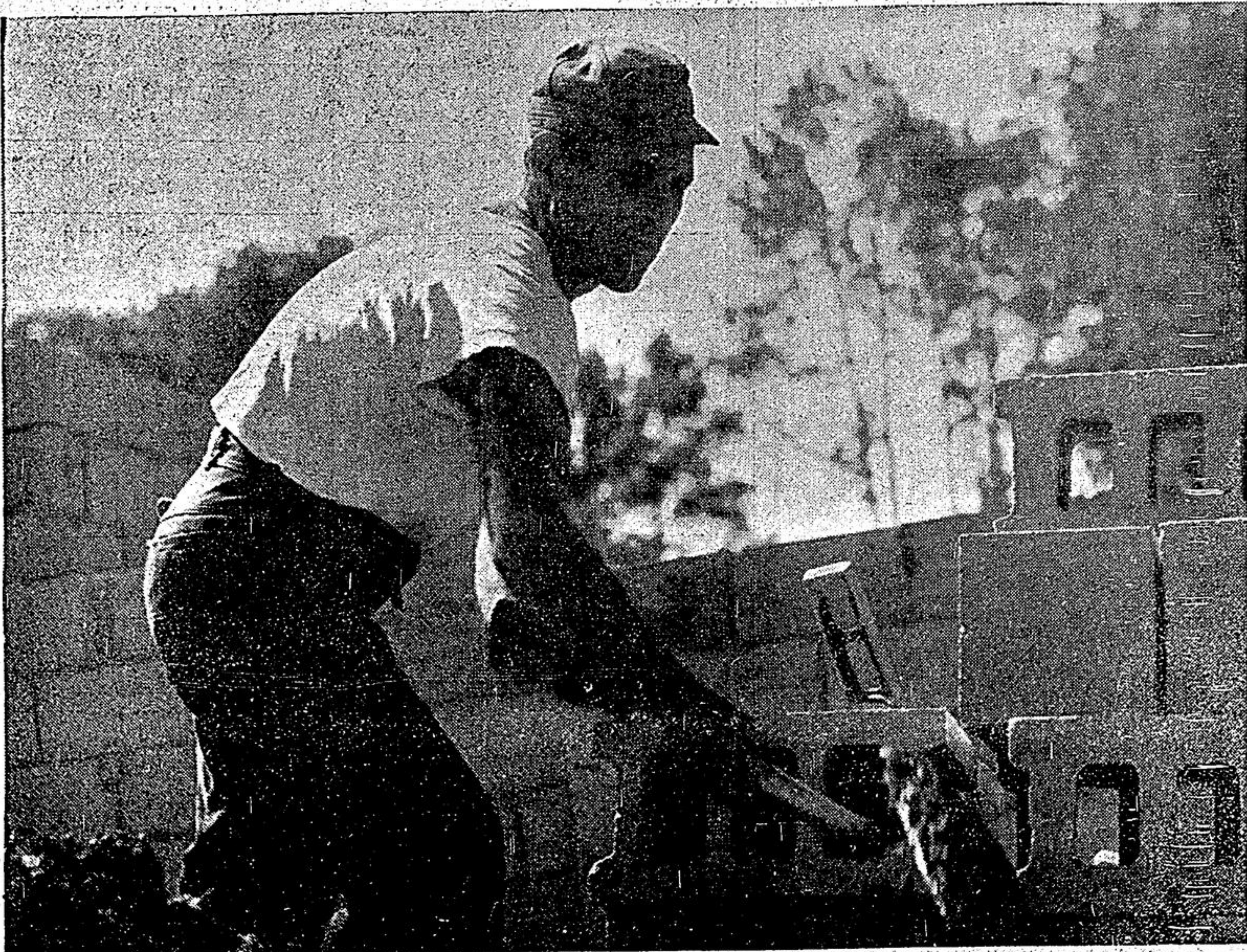

The Canada Pension Plan and its benefits

Here is what the Canada Pension Plan will do for people like Joe Costello, a 52-year-old unmarried labourer who earns \$50 a week.



If Joe continues to work full time until age 65 he can look forward to retiring with a monthly pension of \$54.16 from the Canada Pension Plan and \$75 from Old Age Security—a total of \$129.16. That's almost 60% of what he was earning
