**Baptismal Service At Pioneer Village**

A unique mass baptismal ceremony was held in the Fisherville Presbyterian Church located in the Black Creek Pioneer Village, Jane Street and Steeles Ave., last Sunday.

A total of 12 infants were baptized during the service by the Rev. Ray McCleary, minister of WoodGreen United Church, Toronto.

It marked the first time the 100-year-old church has been used for such a service since it was moved to the Black Creek Pioneer Village in 1960.

During last Sunday's service, the original pewter utensils, including the Communion chalice, cups and tray were donated to the historic church by the congregation. The communion set was originally given to the church by the Dalziel family in the late 1850's.

Another religious event will take place in the church on Sunday, Oct. 3 when the traditional "harvest home" service is held. There will be two services conducted that day — at 1:30 p.m. and at 3 p.m. by the Rev. A. McLean of Willowdale Presbyterian Church.
