

New Bond Issue Coming Up Soon

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the sale of Canada Savings Bonds, and hundreds of thousands of employees in factories and offices throughout the country will be approached during the next two months to purchase the 1965 series through the payroll deduction plan.

Since the first issue of Canada Savings Bonds in 1946, more than \$3½-billion worth of these bonds have been purchased on the payroll savings plan.

A growing number of industries and companies have instituted the payroll plan for their employees as an easy and convenient way of buying Canada Savings Bonds. The employee places an order with his employer for the amount of bonds he wishes to purchase. Each month, a specific amount of money is deducted from his wages or salary to pay for the bonds. These payments can be extended over a 12-month period.

The new 1965 series will be sold at par until November 15 and carry coupons designed to give the investor an average annual return of 5.3% if the bonds are held to maturity in 12 years. The coupons bear interest at the rate of 4½% for the first two years; 5% for each of the next six years; and 5½% for each of the remaining four years.

Most Canadians have a special purpose or goal for saving. It may be a cherished future project such as a more comfortable retirement; helping their children obtain a university education, an opportunity to travel, to buy a home or summer cottage, a business or a farm, or for the purchase of furniture and furnishings. Canada Savings Bonds provide an ideal method of putting aside enough money to realize such a project.

Last year, 664,000 employees across Canada bought \$230-million worth of Canada Savings Bonds through the payroll savings plan. In Ontario alone, sales through payroll savings last year amounted to more than \$82½-million through nearly 229,000 applications.

As in former years, Canada Savings Bonds can be cashed at any time by the holder at any bank in Canada for their full face value plus earned interest. The bonds are again being issued in denominations ranging from \$50 through to \$5,000 with a maximum holding by any

Individual of \$10,000. In addition to being purchased through payroll savings, the new series will also be available for purchase from chartered banks, investment dealers, stockbrokers and trust and loan companies.
