AJAX PARENTS TO RECEIVE MATH COURSE

Parents of Ajax public school children will have an opportunity to learn the new mathematics this fall.

The Ajax Public School Board has decided to offer a series of lectures free of charge at the Parkside Auditorium during the next three months, to acquaint parents with the "new mathematics" now taught in Ontario Schools.

Two keynote addresses will be given at the Parkside Auditorium one on Oct. 6 dealing with the new mathematics from Grades 1-4 and one on Nov. 10 for the Grade 5-8 program. These will be followed with weekly discussions for four

weeks. After the opening session on Oct. 6 there will be a session on Grade 1 mathematics on Oct. 13, Grade 2 on Oct. 20, Grade 3 on Oct. 27 and Grade 4 on Nov. 3.

The keynote address on Nov. 10 will be followed by four Wednesday evening sessions of subjects by topic rather than grade. Ajax Public school teachers will be conducting the course.

Truck Owner, Driver Blamed For Accident

Both the owner and the driver of a transport truck were blamed by a coroner's jury for an accident that killed two persons, near Nairn on July 10.

The driver, Octave Joseph Belle of Markham, and his employer, Alfred Alton, owner of the transport which was operated under the name Trans Provincial Transport Co. of Sault Ste. Marie, were blamed in the death of John Robert Folz, 39, and his daughter, Jill, 7.

They were killed when a trailer loaded with scrap iron broke loose from the tractor and smashed into Folz's car.

The jury said the accident occurred because the driver of the tractor did not visually check the locking mechanism to see that it was properly in place and, secondly, the owner of the tractor had allowed the locking mechanism to rust and corrode to such an extent that it was less than 100 per cent operative.

The jury recommended that in addition to the spring lock device that allows the lock of the trailer to slip into place on the transport, a second manual safety device be added to eliminate future failure of the mechanism on what is commonly known as "the fifth wheel" of a transport.

"Harvest Home" Service At Pioneer Village Sunday Afternoon

A 19th century "harvest home" service will be held Sunday afternoon Oct. 3 at 2 p.m. at Black Creek Pioneer Village, Jane Street and Steeles Ave., in northwest Metro Toronto.

The historic service will be held in the 109-year-old Fisherville Presbyterian Church, one of the 18 buildings in the "living" Black Creek Village. The church was originally located in the community of Fisherville, at the intersection of Steeles Ave. and Dufferin Street, and was moved by truck-trailer to its present site on October 31st, 1960.

The service will be conducted by the Rev. Alexander McLean, of Willowdale Presbyterian Church.

The church will be decorated in the harvest-time tradition, and after each service, the Bolton Community Choir will sing old-time hymns outside the church.

The public is invited to attend the services.

The term "harvest home" derives from British Isles traditions — the older terms "harvest service" and "harvest sermon" were in use throughout the 19th century.

Ancient Celtic and Saxon rituals combined to give us the time of summer or autumn merrymaking known as "harvest home."

Pennsylvania farmers of the Lutheran & Reformed churches gave the American adaption of these old traditions, and in the

ARTHRITIS (Part 1)

For half a million years, arthritis has been the most widespread of chronic diseases. Primarily, it is an inflammation of one or more joints and involves the bone, cartilage, ligaments, muscles, and joint lining. Arthritis is one of the rheumatic diseases which also includes bursitis, myositis, and febricitis.

Rheumatoid arthritis is the common crippling type found more often in women and usually in early middle life. It inflames and may destroy the joint linings, which leads to permanent deformity. There is also an involvement of the muscles, tendons and ligaments surrounding the joint. Pain of movement is produced by the associated muscle spasms and involvement of ligaments and tendons. While the symptoms may be confined to one or several joints, this condition is considered to be systemic in nature, with complex involvement of nervous and chemical control of body functions.

Osteoarthritis, also known as hypertrophic arthritis, is local, confined to one or closely related articulations, and most frequently occurs in middle or later years. The term "hypertrophic" describes the overgrowth and bony spur formations which may develop years after injury, or after years of stress, or poor mechanical alignment of a joint.

The Canada Pension Plan and its benefits

At the time of Robert's death, Mrs. Martin will also be paid a lump sum of \$500.

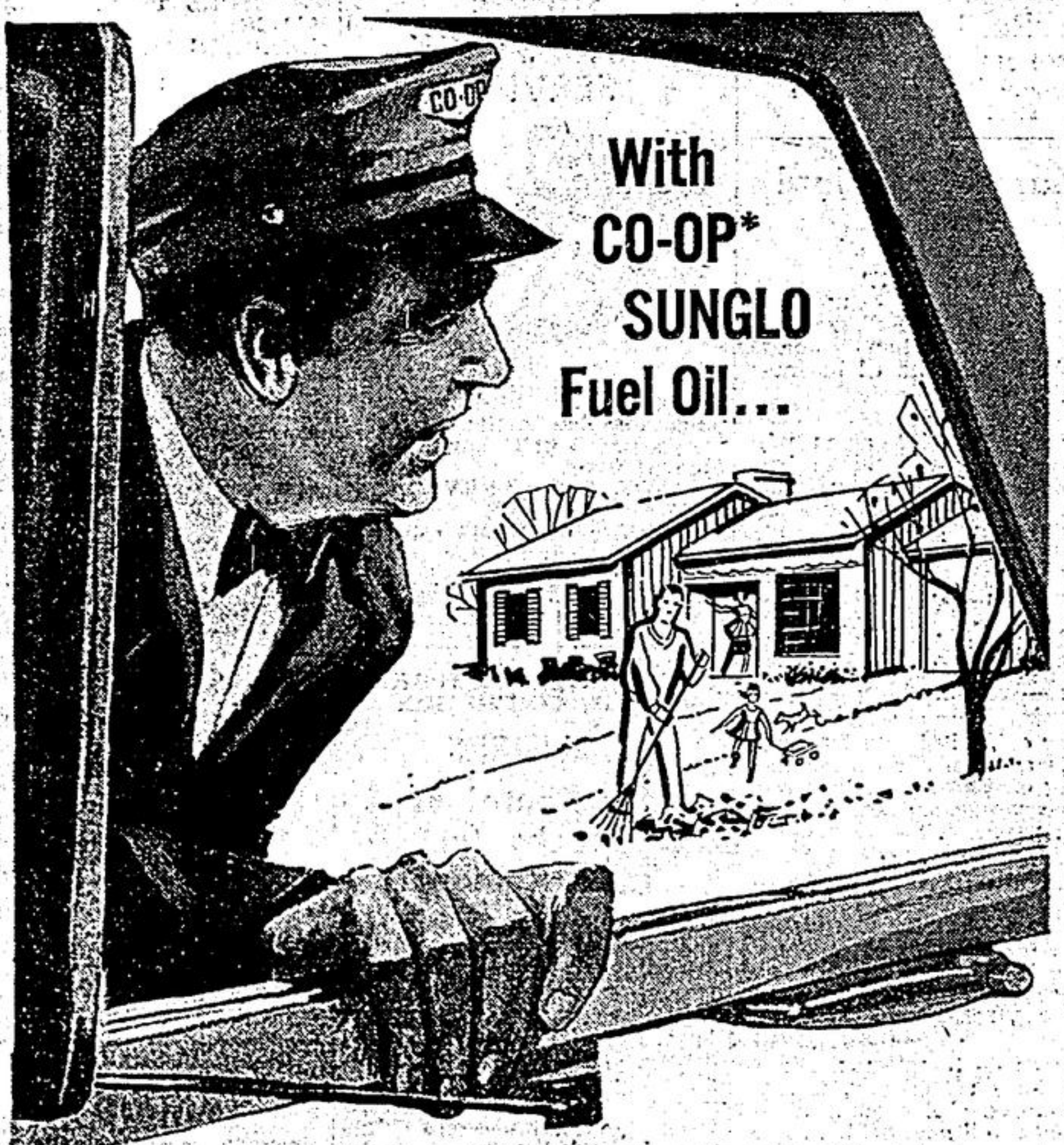
