Rail Fan Excursion Goes Through Town

Another of those popular rail fan excursions passed through Stouffville on Sunday morning enroute from Toronto to Halliburton and return. The train consisting of a baggage car, some ten passenger cars, a cafeteria car, and a new skyview lounge, was drawn by a steam locomotive, one of the few still operational left in the country. A great many citizens perked up their ears about ten a.m. as they heard the familiar whistle that has been silent now for some years. Some were on hand as the train went through in the morning but many more had gathered to see the return run in the evening. The train did not stop here.

Engine Rebuilt
The several other such excursions that have passed through town were drawn by C.N.R. locomotive 6167, but in the fall of last year it became necessary to retire this iron horse. Forseeing the possibility of this the C.N.R. had engine 6218 rebuilt and this summer this engine has made quite a number of these trips, on various lines radiating out of Toronto. The trips are sponsored by the Upper Canada Railway Society.

Diesels From Lindsay On
Steam engine 6218, handled the trip from Toronto to Lindsay and return to Toronto. Two diesels were used from Lindsay to Halliburton and return. The Halliburton line was not built to handle an engine as heavy as 6218, furthermore, there are no facilities in Halliburton to turn engines. The diesels do not require turning but operate in either direction with equal efficiency.

While the train was making the Halliburton trip, 6218 was coaled and watered. The C.N.R. had 203 steam locomotives of this large type at one time, the first one being built in 1927. They were built by a Kingston Company and the Montreal Locomotive Co.

PUBLIC CONFIDENCE

We said we'd first strengthen the economy and improve Canada's finances.

- Here's what we did:
1. Record 9% growth in Gross National Product in 1964. GNP forecast for 1965 is \$51 billion, up another 9% over '64.
 2. Canada's foreign exchange reserves of \$2,648.7 millions highest in six years, up 30% since Tory days.

2. Increased employment by creating 548,000 new jobs (we promised 250,000 per year). Unemployment now at record low of 2.8% versus 7.2% under Tories.
3. Settled the Great Lakes dispute.

We said we'd develop new industries. Here's what we did:

1. Provided tax incentives resulting in establishment of new businesses, particularly in underdeveloped areas.
2. Established new Department of Industry.
3. Secured agreement leading to free trade in automobiles.
4. Establishing the Canada Development Corporation.

5. Restored Canada's standing and influence in NATO and in the United Nations.

1. Improved farm credit, larger amounts and extended to machinery partnerships.
2. Negotiated record export sales of 594.5 million bushels of grain in '63/64; 700 million bushels this year.
3. A Federal Dairy Policy will provide an average \$3.50 per cwt. for manufactured milk, equivalent to cream producers.

We said we'd provide opportunities for youth. Here's what we did:

1. Provided youth allowances of \$10 a month to students 16 to 18.
2. Provided interest free loans to university students.

1. Gave Canada a distinctive flag recognizable the world over.

3. Established B & B Commission to find ways of strengthening Confederation.

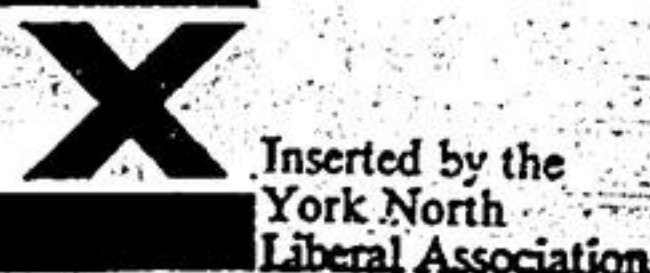

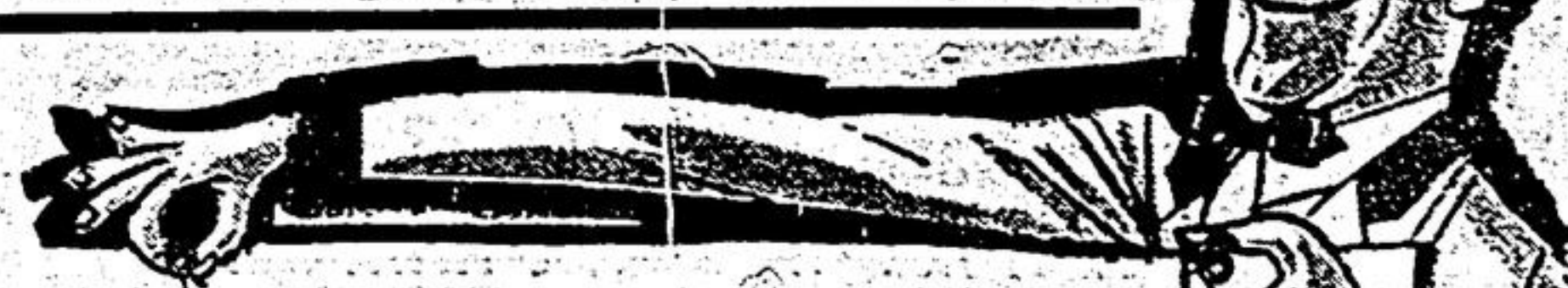

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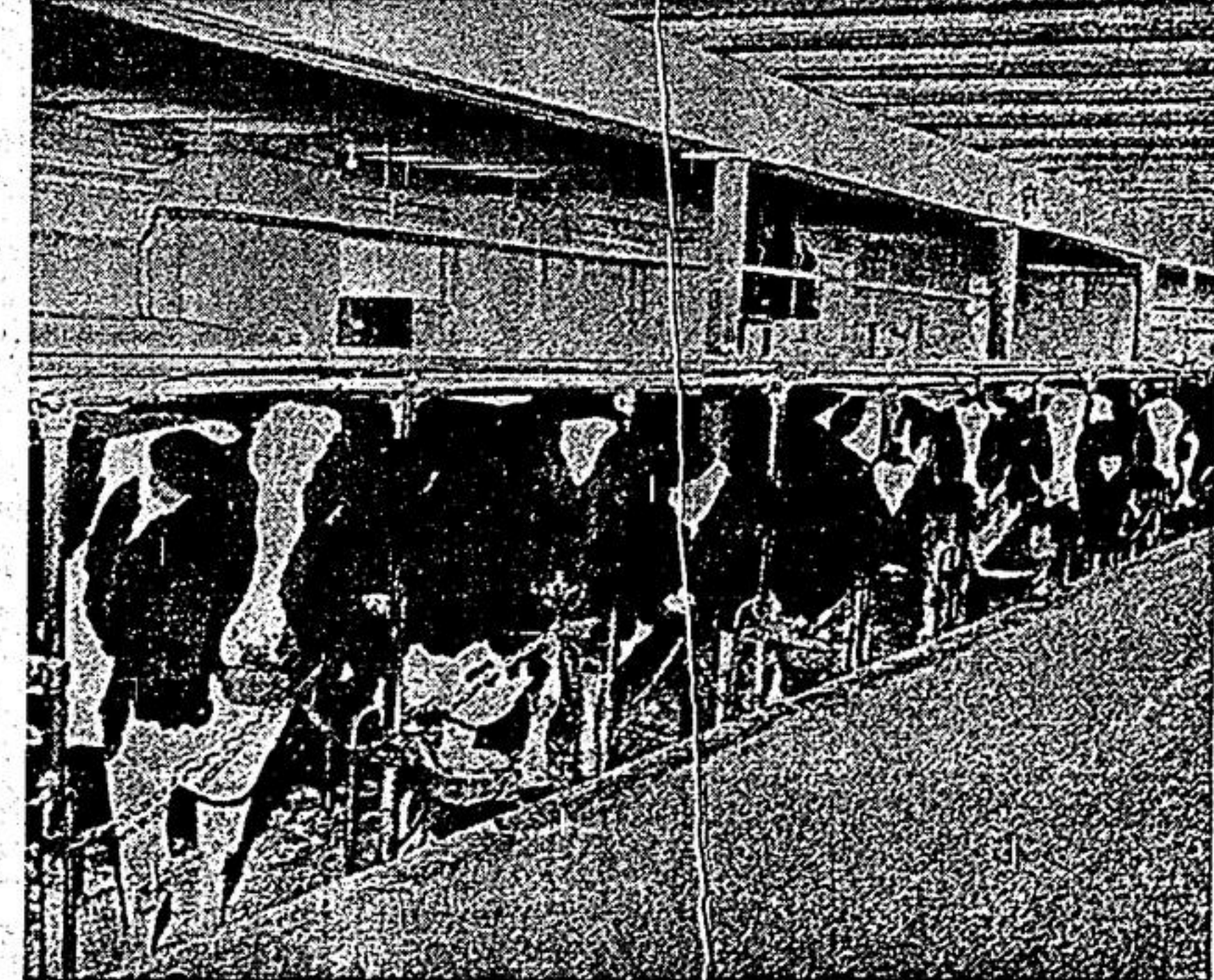
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
