Claremont Girl Jr. Farmer Rep. On Tour

Two Ontario County Junior Farmers, Sharyn Jones of Claremont, and Allan Bailey of Uxbridge, represented Ontario County on the Junior Farmer Eastern Ontario and Quebec Bus Trip earlier this summer.

The following is an excerpt from a report of the trip submitted by Sharyn and Allan. On Sunday, August 15th, they left the depot at Kitchener and proceeded along the route, picking up 44 delegates along the way.

Later that evening, we checked in at the "401 Inn," a motel near Kingston. The Frontenac County Junior Farmers then took us on a conducted tour of Kingston, and later we attended the Frontenac County Junior Farmers' Church Service.

On Monday, Aug. 16th, we left the motel for Gananoque. We enjoyed a beautiful boat cruise through the Thousand Islands.

After a short stop in Morrisburg, From Morrisburg, we proceeded to "Upper Canada Village" and there we enjoyed a very entertaining and educational trip into the past. Following this, we toured the very large and impressive R. H. Saunders St. Lawrence Generating Station in Cornwall. This huge dam spans the St. Lawrence River and is one of the largest in Canada and the United States. That evening, we visited the farm of Lloyd and Ronald McRae at Bainsville in Glengarry County. Their herd of 60 or more Holsteins were yielding an average close to 15,000 lbs. of 3.9% butterfat milk. They attributed this to the feeding of a high energy ration as well as to selective breeding.

On Tuesday, Aug. 17th, we were taken on a conducted tour of Montreal City. During the tour, we visited the site of Expo '67, the World's Fair, which is to be held in Canada on this site in 1967. Work is being done, 24 hours a day, on this site. It is interesting to note that one of the islands on which many countries will be represented, is entirely man-made. That evening, we checked in at Helen's Motel, just outside Quebec City and later we visited the very beautiful St. Anne de Beaupre Catholic Shrine.

On Wednesday, Aug. 18th, we were taken on a conducted tour of Quebec City visiting the Quebec City Parliament Buildings, the oldest church in Quebec City, and many other interesting places. We walked up what is called the narrowest street in North America, located in a very poor slum area of Quebec City. Here, the little French Canadian children sang to us as we walked up the street, and in return they asked for money.

On Thursday, Aug. 19th, we left Quebec City and travelled via the South shore routes to St. Hyacinthe. It was interesting to note, along the way, the small French-Canadian farms and the small, but very well cared-for buildings. That morning we toured the Agricultural Institute of Technology at St. Hyacinthe and some of the aspects of farming in Quebec were explained to us by Mr. G. Luchien, the assistant Farm Manager. In the afternoon, we visited Macdonald College at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, arriving later that evening at the Lord Elgin Hotel on Laurier Avenue in Ottawa.

On Friday, Aug. 20th, we toured the Parliament Buildings in Ottawa and the very beautiful and impressive "Changing of the Guard" on the
