WATER FOR BUTTONVILLE
 After years of debate, it now seems definite that Buttonville will have a watermain in the near future.
 Pipe is being laid along Don Mills Road north of John Street at present, and will run to the northern limits of lot 14 in North Buttonville. The portion from John Street to Rodick Lane will be 12" main, and a six-inch main will serve the area further north.
BUTTONVILLE POST OFFICE OCTOBER 18
 Buttonville Post Office will be opened October 18, at Knob Hill Farm Market, Cor. of Don Mills Road and No. 7 Hwy.

Local residents received official notice of this move last week, with the announcement that Mr. E. C. Wasitls will be Postmaster. Hours will be 9.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m., and 2.00 p.m. to 6.00 p.m., Monday to Saturday.
 The district has been served by rural delivery from Gormley for many years, and a post office in the area will be a distinct advantage. However, the announcement states that all rural route service will be discontinued within a half-mile of the office. This, in a place where two very busy highways cross and there are no sidewalks, would seem to invite disaster. In many cases the man

in the family is away with the family car from well before 9.00 a.m. until after the post-office closes at 6 p.m. The need for continuance of all rural route delivery along Don Mills Road, and No. 7 highway, seems imperative. Another factor that Buttonville proper will remain on the R.R.2 Gormley mailing list seems the height of folly.
