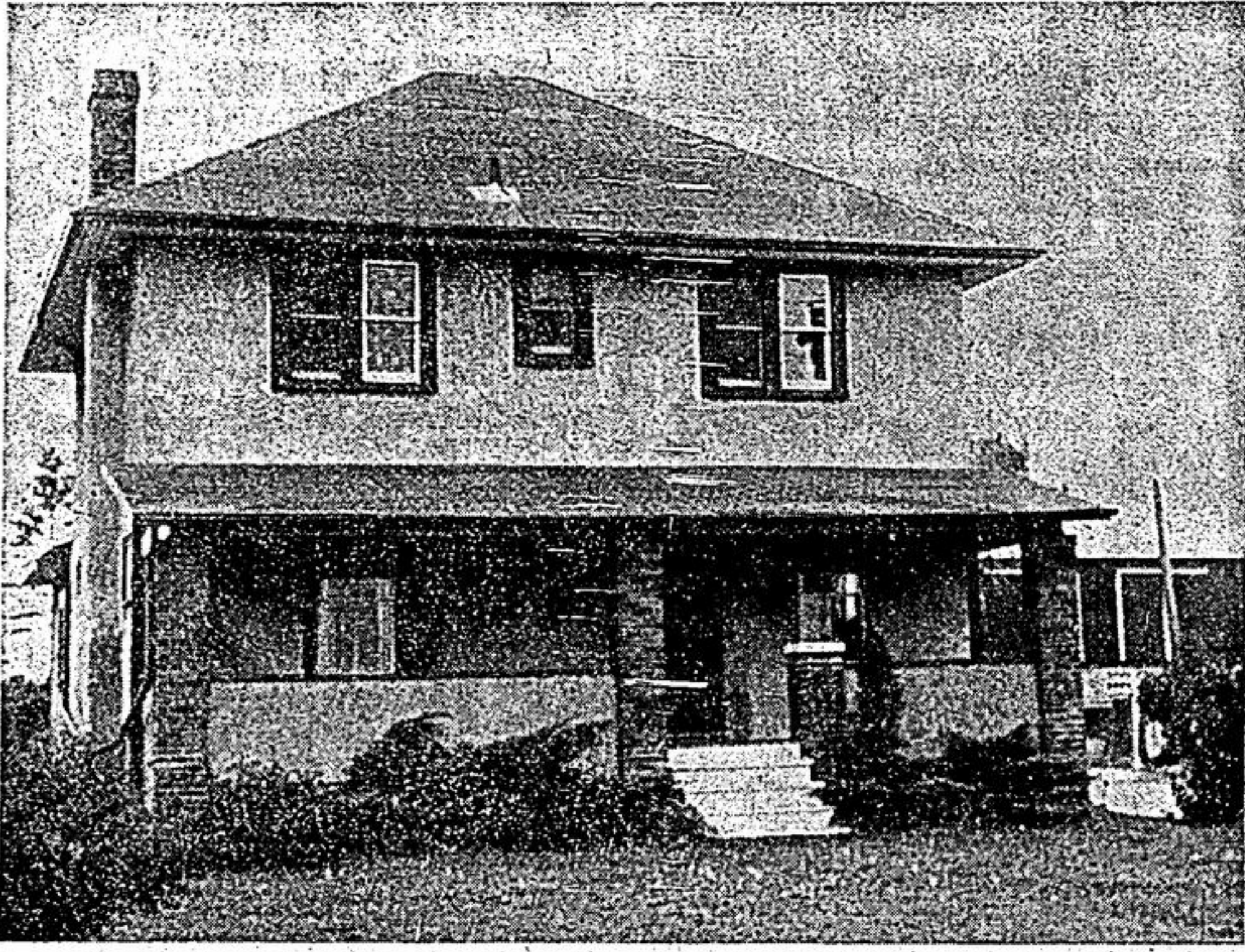

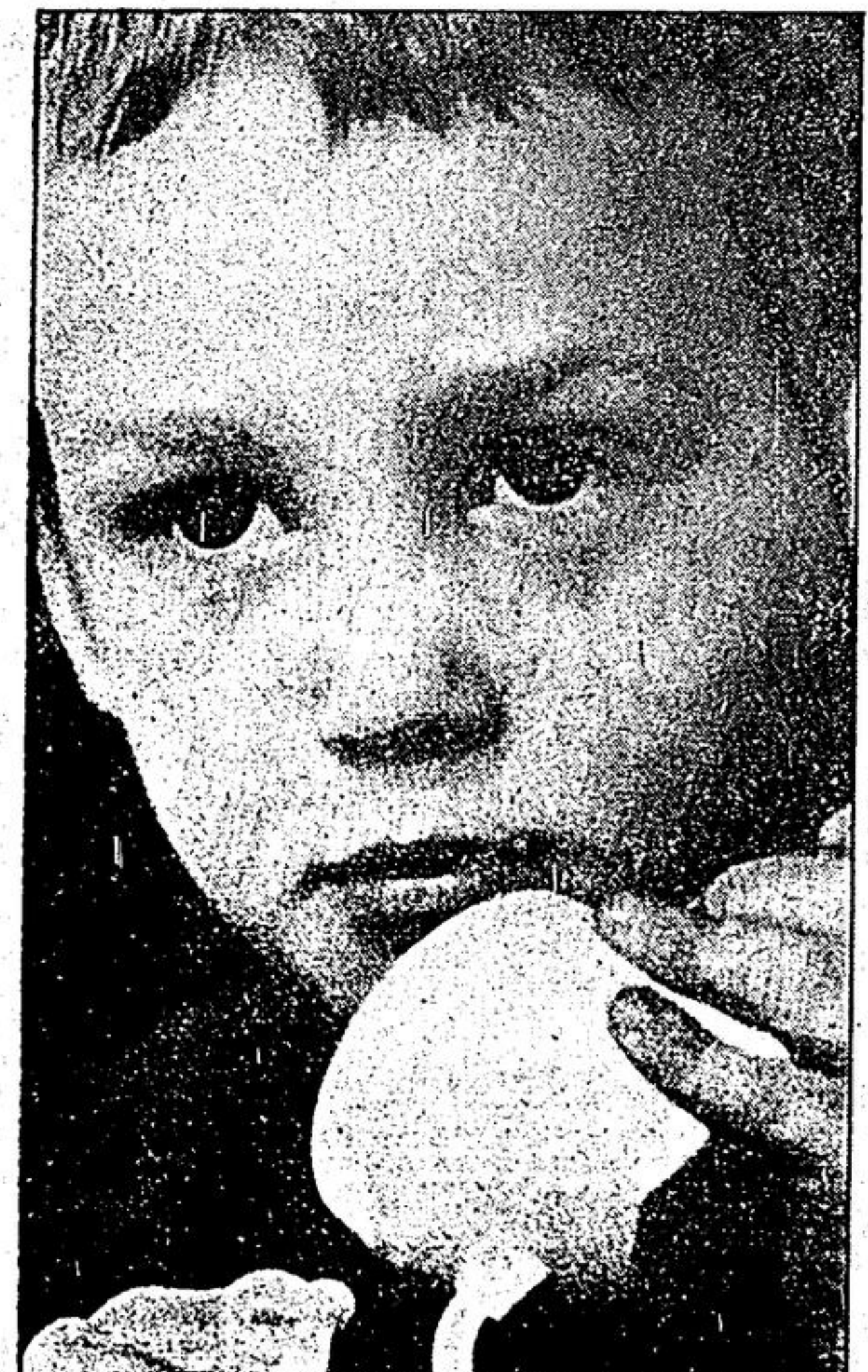
The Jones boys have both returned home following their individual stays in hospital. Derek suffered a broken arm at his home, and Jeremy has recovered from a leg operation.
