### Fall Care Of Peonies

Dividing and planting of peo-nies is best done in the fall, advise horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Late September or October, just as the leaves are dying back, is the ideal time.

Peonies do not require dividing frequently but, if the clumps are large and overcrowded. they should be dug and split. Do not expect bloom next year from these divided plants as they require a year to become reestablished.

Dig up the plants and shake or wash the soil from around the roots. Divide the clumps by cutting them with a sharp, clean knife. A good division should have three to four basal buds just above the roots. Cut out all dead or damaged roots.

Next, prepare the bed for the new planting by spading in plenty of organic matter in the form of peat moss, manure, or leaf mold, Add a standard commercial fertilizer such as 5-10-15 or 5-20-20 at 3 pounds per 100 square feet. The division should be covered with no more than two inches of soil. Planting too deeply is often the reason why peonies fail to bloom.


