Legitimate Farmer Status Questioned by Pickering Bd.

The Pickering Twp. Planning Board has to determine, from time to time, whether or not a man is a bona fide farmer. Members declare that no satisfactory definition of a farmer has come before them yet.

If a man can prove that he is a farmer, or that his intentions are purely agricultural, he may build an 1150 square foot house rather than the otherwise required 2,000 square foot house.

Frank Benn, a high school teacher, who farms beside, purchased the 250-acre Newton Robinson farm at Whitevale. He separated 10 acres with the house and buildings, and plans to sell them to help subsidize his farming operation. Finding that it is too difficult to work this land from his home at Gormley, he wants to separate another 10 acres and build upon it a house of 1150 square feet. The purpose of the separation is to obtain an NHA mortgage on his proposed home.

Losses Status

Immediately this separation takes place it loses its farm status and becomes a new lot requiring a 2,000 square foot house.

"As soon as we separate any portion, it opens the door to the existing stone house on the 5th concession," said member Herb Wank, "with another 200 acres without a house, on which you could build three houses."

"The only thing I see," he continued, "is that it is creating a new lot, on which should be

charged the \$500 fee. The reason for this is to discourage development. It is circumventing the reason for the fee."

"This is not an application to separate land," said Planning Director Faulkner (ten acres can be separated without consent of the board). "If he goes to 10 acres, is he a farmer or is he not a farmer?"

Rex Merritt introduced a motion that the smaller sized house be permitted.

Member J. C. Irwin ascertained that the Newton Robinson stone house was going to be sold, and stated that the new owner could use the proceeds to pay for a smaller house, and obtain a mortgage.

Good Business

Mr. Laycox thought this good business and congratulated the owner, but Mr. Wank questioned this arrangement as far as the board was concerned:

"Here is a man who can sell 10 acres with a house on it and put a house on another 10 acres. I cannot support a resolution that presents a loop-hole approach."

Mr. Wank contended that Mr. Benn did not need to approach the board.

"This man is too honest," he said. "I don't see why this board should encourage something that it does not encourage in the township."

"No matter what his motives may be, if he is a bona fide farmer, his application should be considered," said Rex Merritt.

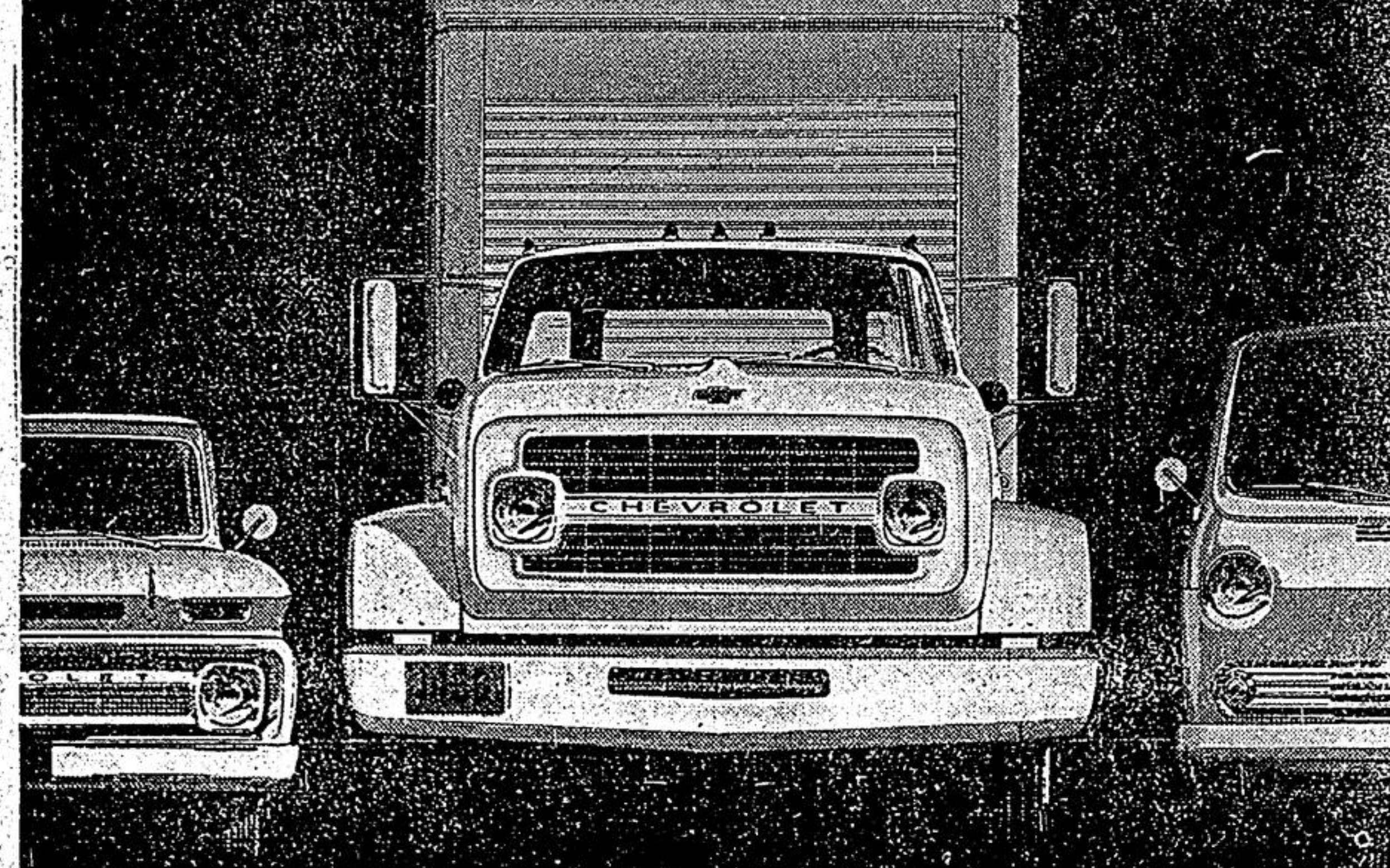
