The bargains will be bigger and the buys will be better as Markham's Canadian Tire store celebrates its giant renovation sale. Thursday (today), Friday and Saturday have been set aside to mark the end of many months of construction to the store.
Not only will the purchaser find extra value savings, he will also be shopping in the most modern of surroundings. Store Manager Ray Bratton, explained the sale this way: "during renovation, the shoppers seemed to stay away from the store, and this sale is being held with the intention of bringing them back, and giving them something to come back for."
Canadian Tire Corporation was instrumental in the building of Hwy. 7 into a business zone. Things were pretty desolate when they first opened their doors eight years ago. Since then, the road has literally 'opened up', and is now laden on both sides with plazas, schools, service stations, and homes.
Cost of the monster fixing up job was estimated at nearly \$20,000 and regular customers will note the change throughout.
The general sales area has been increased from 2,000 to 4,000 square feet. The sales staff has doubled from 12 to 25, including part time help.
With the re-opening, shoppers will find three distinct departments to choose from. They are the automotive, sports and hardware, with each section carrying a complete line of goods. Mr. Bratton said the store presently has \$100,000 worth of stock in it.
The auto parts sales department has been moved to the lower level of the store, enabling customers to shop on two different floors. Anticipating the sale, the store now has 800 tires in stock, all sizes and features.
The new receiving area, which has been added to the south part of the building comes complete with an ultra modern 5-day service department. There are four full time mechanics on the job. Canadian Tire has just installed an electronic analyzer, which can
