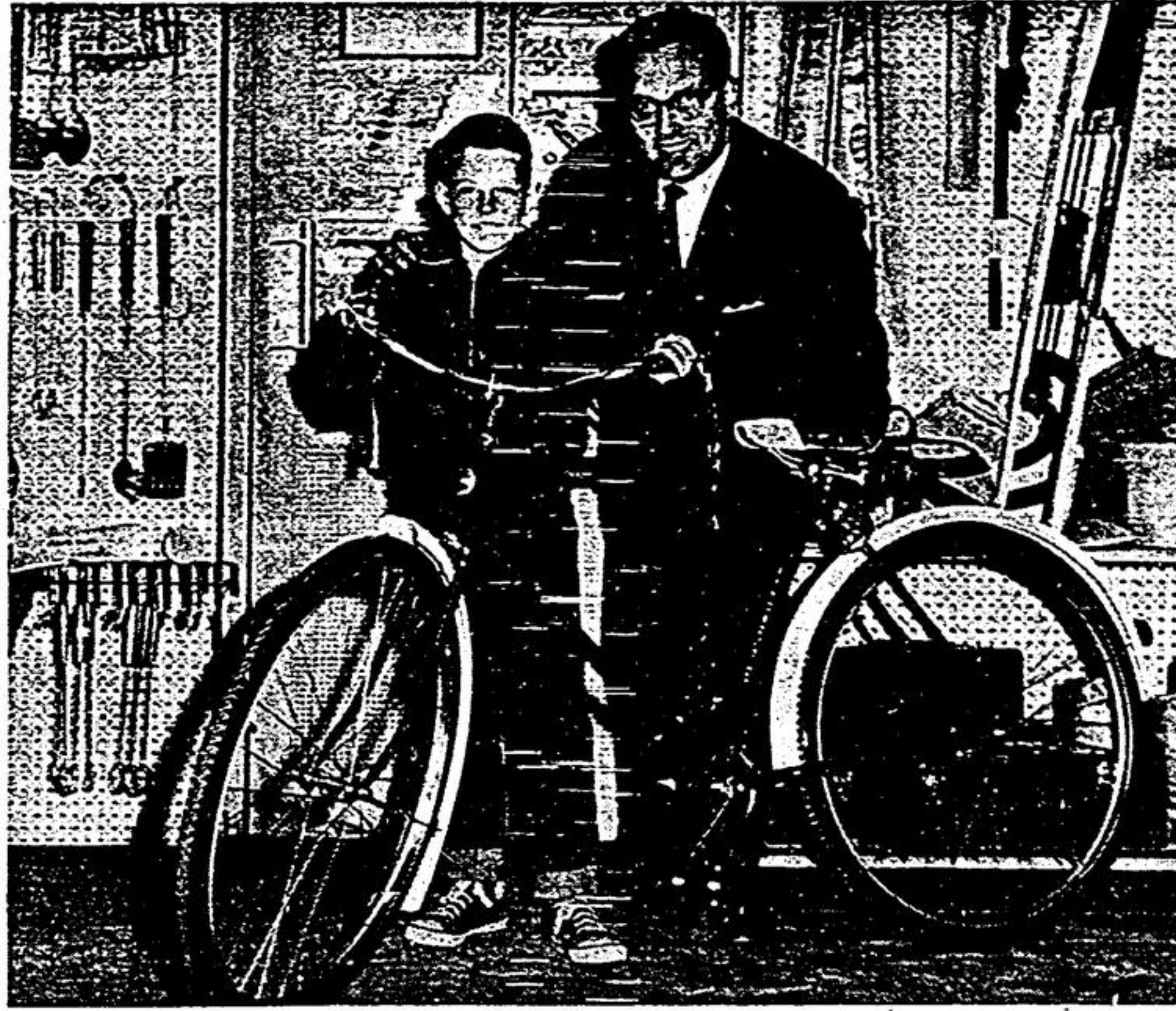




## Unionville Folks Win Valuable Prizes at Canadian Tire Store Draw

## PC Candidate, Donald Martyn Advocates Agricultural Schools

Donald Martyn, PC candidate for North York riding advocated a new agricultural policy for Canada, including Agricultural Schools along the line of those constructed in the technical field. These, he said, should lift the farming industry to higher levels with a more adequate return to those operating the farms. Mr. Martyn was speaking at a public meeting in the Stouffville Masonic Hall.

He said that the union of the provinces should be strengthened, and advocated a national plan for education.

Mr. Wm. Parsons, chairman of the meeting called on C. A. "Tiny" Cathers, former federal member, to introduce the Hon. Walter Dinsdale. Mr. Dinsdale spoke on the need for responsible government, one with integrity. He considered that the number of members in the last Liberal Cabinet who had no previous experience as a laxity on the government's part. He said the Conservatives had a large number of men experienced in Parliament, and many other good young candidates such as Mr. Martyn.

"A new National Development Policy will be introduced," he said. A Conservative government would call a Confederation Conference to draw up a new concept of the national destiny based on union. "That 11% sales tax on building materials will be withdrawn," he assured his listeners. Mr. Dinsdale also touched upon the expansion of foreign trade, an increase of the old age pension and reduction of high interest loans.

## United Church 112th Anniversary This Sunday

Stouffville United Church will mark the 112th anniversary of the congregation this Sunday, Oct. 31st, with special services both morning and evening. The special speaker for the morning service will be Rev. I. G. Perkins of Donlands United Church, taking the subject, "How to Be Someone Without Trying." In the evening, Rev. James Mills from Uxbridge will occupy the pulpit. At both services Mr. Garnet Brooks, renowned Canadian tenor will sing and there will be special organ and choir music.

The Illustrated Free Press, published in Stouffville in 1895, has this to say of the beginning of the local congregation. "As far back as 1841, the Rev. Edward Sallows, occasionally preached in the old school house on Church Street. After twelve years a regular mission was organized with Rev. Cornelius Flummerfelt as minister. In 1855 the school house was bought and re-modelled. In 1872 this building was found to be insufficient for the growing congregation and a brick building was erected at a cost of \$4,000. After twenty years, with two hundred members, the present commodious building was erected and the charge became independent."
