Bussing Kiddies to Distant Schools Concerns Board

The problem of bus transportation in Markham Twp. School Area No. 2 is causing increased concern among Board members, especially where the small kiddies are concerned.

Trustee Eldred King was most outspoken on the issue. "It looks ridiculous," he said, "many children are leaving for school before many adults are leaving for work."

Although the matter is a worry to both the board and the parents, there appears, at the present time, to be no solution to the problem. "This is one of the penalties of bussing," noted trustee Mrs. Mildred Toogood, "if all were transported to one central school, the difficulty would be eliminated. I'm surprised that it works as well as it does, with children criss-crossing all over the Area."

In spite of the early pick-up hours, the Heise busses still have difficulty in keeping schedules due to unpaved roads and poor turning places.
