

# Hwy. Accident On Way To School Is Fatal To District Teacher

GREENWOOD — On Wednesday, Oct. 20th, Mrs. Lynn H. Eastwood, a lifelong and highly respected resident of this area, died in the Oshawa General Hospital as the result of an accident, seven days earlier.

Her eastbound car was in collision with a heavy piece of road equipment near Kinsale on No. 7 Highway. She was on her way to Sinclair School in Whitby Twp. when the accident occurred. She was in her 41st year.

Born near Greenwood, she was the former Mildred Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Brown. She received her education in Greenwood Public School, Whitby High School and the Toronto Teachers' College.

Mrs. Eastwood served as Principal of the Audley Public School, the Greenwood Public School and the Baggotville School before taking over grades 6 and 7 at the Sinclair School.

Besides her husband, she leaves a daughter, Linda. Also surviving are two brothers, Fred N. Brown of Brookline; Win. A. Brown Jr. of Greenwood and her aunt, Miss May E. Brown, also of Greenwood.

Mrs. Eastwood was a devoted member of the Greenwood United Church and the United Church Women's organization. She had been a member of a church choir during her teenage years.

The funeral service, one of the largest ever held in the Greenwood Church, was conducted by the Pastor, Rev. T. H. Fleisham, with interment in the family plot at Salem. The pall bearers were Ernest Trimble, Douglas Morden, Leslie Wilson, Ed. Pascoe, Jack Hooker and Lorne Slute.

The floral tributes were most beautiful and showed the high esteem in which she was held.

## Area 1 Sr. School Would Raise Standard Of Education — Chairman

BROUGHAM — Last week, Pickering Public School Inspector, J. C. McClelland, revealed that the Board of School Area No. 1 was considering the erection of a new building to accommodate only the students of grades 7 and 8. The children would be transported by bus to this one central point.

The plan has been met by some opposition within the area and on Sunday, the Chairman, Mr. Donald Gibson, outlined the reasons for such a move.

He said that it was only fair that students from Area 1 should enter high school on the same academic level as pupils from Area 2, Ajax and Pickering Village.

Mr. Gibson said that it is planned to close the six old 1-room and 2-room schools in the Area and add rooms where required to some of the remaining schools. These would accommodate the junior pupils from grades 1 to 6.

Increase 2½ Mills Mr. Gibson discounted the report that the program would increase the rate by ten mills. He estimated the increase at 2½ mills for a new 12-room Senior School plus the additional four rooms as well as additional operating costs. This would raise the rate to 17½ mills as compared to 15 mills at the present time.

The Chairman said that a careful study had been made of population trends in the Area and he predicted a students increase of 300 in the next five years. The present enrollment is about 1,300 pupils. He noted that the Board is very mindful of the tax load that the School Area can carry.

Mr. Gibson admitted that while the majority of members favoured a start on a Senior School, two members favoured adding to the existing schools first. He said that no decision would be made by the Board that could not be reversed in 1966.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be held on Monday, Nov. 1st at 8 p.m.

## Area 2 Board Asks Education Cost Relief

ROSEBANK — The Pickering Area No. 2 School Board at a meeting Wednesday night approved briefs to Ontario Premier John Robarts and Education Minister William Davis that request major changes in the Pickering Township educational system.

Premier Robarts will be asked for additional grants to alleviate the tax burden of the Area 2 ratepayers who were asked to pay 32 mills in support of their schools this year.

He will be asked to meet with the school board to discuss the grants asked for by the board backed by the Goldenberg Report and the lack of industrial assessment in Pickering Township.

Education Minister Davis will be asked that consideration be given to amalgamate the Area 2 Board with surrounding education boards.

One suggestion made in the brief was to join the area which presently makes up the Pickering High School District, namely all of Pickering Township including Pickering Village and Ajax, into one board of education.

Another suggestion to the education minister was that the Pickering Area 2 School Board jurisdiction be joined with the Goldenberg proposed District 11 which cover the east 40 per cent of Scarborough.

Public Relations Committee Chairman John Williams said that both the increased grants and the amalgamation were necessary for better education in Area 2 which he said were already 10 to 15 years behind in education facilities.

Mr. Williams said that without the grants they could not expect a town in the high school district to look favorably to amalgamating with an area whose assessment was 97 per cent residential.

The briefs will also be sent to Albert Walker, M.L.A.; Pickering Township Council and the federal member when the election decides who this will be.

## Former General Store Once Brougham Hotel Is Now Museum Piece

CLAREMONT — During the widening of the Brock Road between Brougham and Claremont, the original sign of the first hostelry to serve Brougham and vicinity was found beneath the old building that stood on Hwy. No. 7. It was discovered when the building was raised to put a moving truck underneath. It read "Brougham Central Hotel."

The old hotel could be seen for miles dead ahead as people drove north from Pickering. The exact date of its erection is not known, but the split lath used in the walls under the plaster shows that it was built before 1850. After its demise as a hotel, it was used as a general store.

The last to use it was Mr. Geo. Mutch who gave the building to the County when he went out of business. It has been moved to the site of the Pickering Twp. Museum where, according to Mr. Bob Miller, Chairman of the Museum committee, it will be restored as closely as possible to its original condition and take its place among the historical buildings and objects that the museum is endeavoring to preserve.

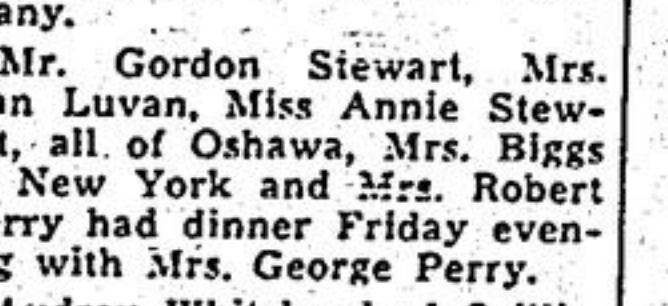
