




Near Deficiency In Dairy Products Claims Minister

Preliminary plans for the inauguration of Ontario's comprehensive milk plan, passed at the last session of the Legislature, have proceeded so well that the Act is likely to be proclaimed in November, Hon. Wm. A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, told the Waterloo Helstein Breeders' Association at Kitchener recently.

The Minister indicated that this was at least two months earlier than had been thought possible at the conclusion of the last session of the Legislature.

"It would appear likely that as soon as possible after the proclamation of the Act, that secondary milk prices of fluid shippers will be brought more in line with established manufacturing prices," said the Minister, adding that present prices would seem to be inconsistent in many cases.

Mr. Stewart said that during the preparation of the legislation he had kept in close touch with the top dairy officials of his department, and with the officials of both the Ottawa and Quebec Governments.

"We were assured by the Federal Minister of Agriculture that These two bodies hold virtu- can't do anything basically to a national dairy commission boards or any regional agencies that might be established." said the Minister. "I may add that that was welcome news.'

Mr. Stewart said that it was his belief that there must be a national dairy commission to provide for a long term policy for the country as a whole. A dairy policy on a yearly basis could no longer be tolerated.

Under a national policy, re-sponsibility would be assumed for the removal from the domestic market of the comparatively small surplus which, in effect, established the price on the domestic market.

"Whether we realize it or not. Canada is dangerously close to heing a dairy products deficit nation," said the Minister "This may seem to be an incredible situation. In 1964 we produced only 2.7 per cent more dairy products than we consumed in Canada. Bearing this figure in mind, there seems little justification that the export - or world market price - for such a comparatively small amount of our production should have been allowed to determine the price for our entire manufactured production."

Mr. Stewart pointed out that Western grain growers recognized the value of a national agency to strengthen their position. "Is it not time that Canadian dairy farmers followed suit Of course there is discipline with a similar agency such as a National Dairy Commission?"



PROSPERITY IS CONTAGIOUS




MEDICARE

"Everyone must have access to medical care whenever needed and without fear of erippling bills", John Addison maintains.

A majority Liberal government in Ottawa will introduce a National Medicare Plan. Prime Minister Pearson has set a target date of July 1st, 1967. It will provide comprehensive physicians services including specialists, be universally available without means tests, be portable anywhere in Canada, and be publicly administered by the provinces. The \$300 million federal share will be financed through general revenues from our expanding economy. No increase in sederal taxation will be required.

A Liberal government will also assure expanded health training and research facilities, and more trained medical people, through a special \$500 million Health Resources Fund. The Fund will provide for construction, renovation and equipment for health training facilities.



EDUCATION

"My goal is free education for all Canadians with ability, and free education immediately for post grad-

uate students," said John Addison recently. Educational facilities will be greatly expanded under a majority Liberal government. Federal aid for university education alone, amounting to \$330 million next fiscal year, will be provided. This amount is almost equal to the total expenditures in 1964/65 by the ten provinces and the federal government combined. The Bladen Report on Higher Education also called

MAJORITY GOVERNMENT


Three elections in three years is too much. Canada needs a majority parliament that can govern for a full four-
