This does seem like a casual procedure for Her Majesty's mail service, and the sign at the Post Office still reads: Hours 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. Saturdays: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

I called Mr. J. G. Fultz, the District Director of Postal Service. I asked him about this matter of getting mail from a post office after legal hours, and he called it a loaded question.

He said the post master could set his hours of service beyond the recognized times if he so desired, but the postal authorities can pay for only so many hours, the minimum wage being \$1.25 per hour. He said only authorized persons may handle mail.

Just as long as we know that all persons who handle the mail are authorized, fine! It's nice to know we don't take the walk for nothing.

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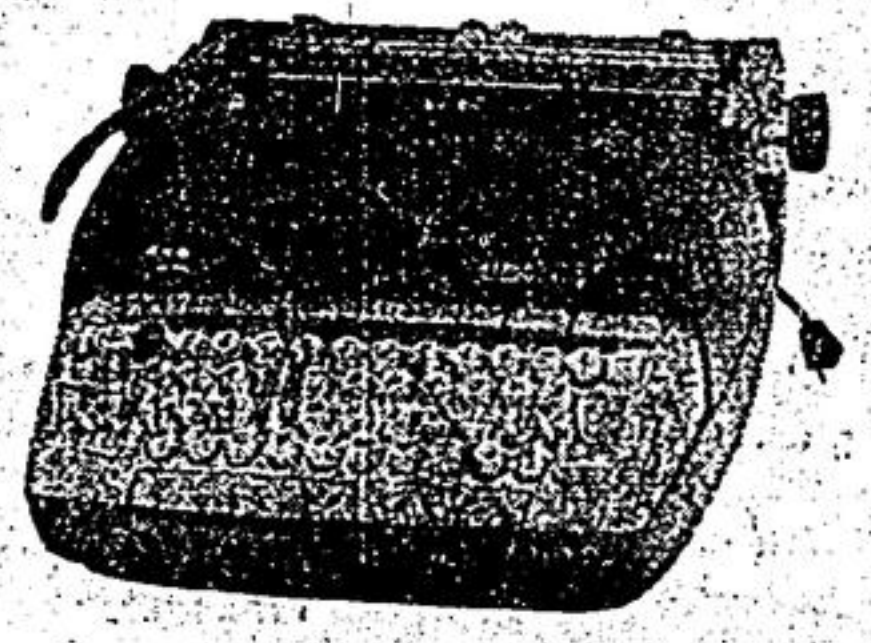

Roses Need Protection During Winter Months
 To help trap the snow and give extra protection, cedar brush or twiggy branches should be placed on top. Before applying these materials, make sure that the ground is frozen, thus discouraging mice invasion and consequent damage. In areas where the winters tend to be severe it may be necessary to cover the bushes completely with soil. Climbing or rambling roses are best protected by tying the canes together, and bending them as close to the ground as possible without causing breaking or splitting. Then fasten them to a stake and carefully cover with soil. Another method consists of wrapping the canes with straw or burlap and leaving them attached to their support.
