# Norm Baker Takes Over Secretary-Treasurer Post For Stouffville P.U.C.

STOUFFVILLE — A long-time Stouffville resident who has wide business experience, Norman A. Baker now has assumed the position of Secretary-Treasurer of Stouffville Public Utilities Commission, to which he was appointed recently. He fills the vacancy created by the sudden death of Elmer Daniels who held the position of Secretary-Treasurer for over five years.

Mr. Baker was born on a farm in the Stouffville area. He attended grade and continuation school at Stouffville and graduated from Markham High School. Later he completed a business course at Dominion Business College and also attended the University of Toronto.

Entering the banking field he served in various positions at a number of branches and at Head Office in Toronto of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. After World War II service, Mr. Baker returned to the bank.

He continued in a number of posts, one of those being Manager at the West Hill Branch of the bank in Scarborough. Then he accepted the position of Manager and Secretary-Treasurer of the Bethesda and Stouffville Telephone Company. He continued with this firm for 3 1/2 years, when it was taken over by the Bell Telephone Company of Canada. Mr. Baker served for five years as a Section Manager for the Bell Telephone Company property and cost accounting office. At the end of October, he left the Bell Company and on November 4th took over the vacant post of Secretary-Treasurer of Stouffville Public Utilities Commission.

# Preserving Remembrance Day Protects the Young

Preservation of Remembrance Day protects our young people against the folly of war. Rev. F. H. Cromey told the gathering in the Legion Hall, Stouffville, at the annual Remembrance Day service. The local Presbyterian minister drew this statement from a number of student essays written on the subject, "What Remembrance Day Means to Me."

Rev. Cromey spoke of his experience as a member of a YMCA group stationed in France in 1940 in support of the British Expeditionary Force. He said their greatest danger and hardship was the result of fifth columnists, and not being in touch with the top command. He drew this as a comparison of being out of touch with God.

Other participating ministers in the service were Rev. Geo. Davison, local Legion Padre, Rev. A. L. Borland and Rev. J. L. Ball. Bugler Paul Benson played The Last Post and Reveille.

Following the service, the Legion members, the Auxiliary Ladies and various local youth groups headed by the colourful Caledonia Pipe Band, paraded to the Memorial Park gates and War Memorial, for the laying of wreaths.

At the park gates the Ladies' Auxiliary wreath was laid by Mrs. Del Jennings and the Lions Club wreath by Mr. Lorne Bowdway. # Pathologist Dr. Erb Dies

Dr. Isaac Huber Erb of 138 Langs Dr., Preston, died at South Waterloo Memorial Hospital, Galt, on Saturday, Nov. 6, 1963. He is survived by his wife, the former Olive Troxel, sons Dr. John T. Erb of Toronto, Dr. Gordon Erb of Preston, and daughters, Margaret (Mrs. G. M. Hopwood) of Barrie and Olive (Mrs. Charles Tipp) of Port Credit. He was in his 80th year. Funeral services were held on Wednesday at the Eastfield Memorial United Missionary Church in Toronto with interment in the Hagey Cemetery.

Dr. Erb was a former pathologist for the Hospital for Sick Children. He was with the hospital for 28 years, and served as the attorney general's department consulting pathologist for 11 years and for 8 years was assistant professor of pathology at the University of Toronto.

He was a former President of the Evangelical Medical Missionary Society. Dr. Erb retired to Preston 5 years ago. In his earlier years he was well known around Stouffville, having been a guest minister at the United Missionary church.

## Legion Ladies Tea and Bazaar Great Success

STOUFFVILLE — One of the highlights of the Annual Remembrance Day Tea and Bazaar held last Saturday in the Legion Hall, was the antique display, which drew a large crowd. Bringing back memories to some were the spinning wheel and wicker cradle (100 years old) owned by Mrs. H. Murphy. A wool winder also 100 years old belonging to Mr. L. Weldon drew many comments.

A very rare item indeed was the 200 year old sewing machine owned by Mr. Bill Malloy, which caused a great deal of interest owing to the fact that it is still in working order.

A beautiful tea chest, with pearl inlay over 100 years old and a Georgian foot stool 130 years old done in beaded embroidery, were only 2 of the many lovely antiques put in the display, through the courtesy of Mrs. B. Jackson of the Stouffville Antique House. A parlour table over 100 years old and a tiny china head doll which was 150 years old, showed plainly the fine craftsmanship of that time and the care received by Mrs. B. Clarkson.

The brass lantern clock made in 1646 and a Sheraton inlaid table of 1790, owned by Mrs. Art Dixon also displayed the care given as they have been handed down to the present family.

One of the telephones displayed by Mr. Del Jennings was built before 1891 and proves that the telephone has come a long way in operation and design.

A treasured possession belonging to Mrs. R. Fleury was the China teapot with stand, which is 125 yrs. old. The children's furniture was made to last in those days as was shown in the 80 yr. old high chair, 75 yr. old rocking horse and the 85 yr. old child's wicker rocking chair.

The styles in the antique clothing on display caused many remarks on the needle work and design. The lace baby dress over 100 yrs. old was an eye catcher as were the wedding dresses, one 70 yrs. old and one 45 years.

The town of Stouffville of 1888 was a high point of interest, with many people looking at the old pictures and trying to place the present day sights. There were many antiques in this show, far too many to mention all of them here. Each and every item, so kindly loaned, helped to make this the success it was.
